FSC Tests Show 30% Of Students Can't Swim

Each year the fact that approximately 30 per cent of college-age young people living in Michigan's water wonderland are non-swimmers comes to light in a series of orientation tests given to entering Ferris students.

In their pre-entrance testing program, students are asked to swim two lengths of the Ferris pool (50 yards) demonstrating four basic strokes. Those who cannot navigate this stretch of water are assigned to beginning swimming classes as one of their physical education requirements. Generally speaking the non-swimmer must pass this beginning swimming course before he is allowed to graduate.

During the summer 2,489 students—1,502 men and 987 women—took the swimming tests. Out of this group, coming from all parts of the state of Michigan, 338 men or 22.5 per cent, and 427 women (43.2 per cent) were classified as non-swimmers. There are more advanced swimmers than non-swimmers among the men; however, there are more non-swimmers among the women than there were intermediate swimmers.

Among the men tested, 709 were classified as intermediate swimmers, and 455 were classified as advanced swimmers. Of the women 288 were classed as intermediate swimmers and 272 were classified as advanced swimmers.

Entering freshmen students who did not take the swimming test during the summer were given the test during the first week of orientation.

Ferris' swim-test program is unique among colleges, according to Dr. Herbert Peterson, head of the Department of Health and Physical Education, but it is almost standard procedure among schools which train men for the military.
