

## Remote Access to LUIS via WSUnet

LUIS, the Library User Information System, is the online catalog for the Wayne State University Library System and other DALNET (Detroit Area Library Network) libraries. LUIS is accessible to anyone using one of over 1,000 on-campus WSUnet terminals and to users dialing in on the Merit Computer Network throughout metropolitan Detroit and across the State of Michigan. Access to LUIS requires no special IDs or passwords and is free to use.

### CONNECTING TO WSUnet

#### ■ HARDWIRED TERMINALS ON WSU CAMPUS

Hardwired terminals are permanently connected to WSUnet. When turned on, the first screen displayed is the WSU net menu.

#### ■ DIAL-UP ACCESS

Dial-up access to WSUnet is through the statewide Merit Computer network. You will need either a supported terminal or a microcomputer, like an IBM, Macintosh or Zenith, with a modem and terminal communications/emulation software. WSU's Computing and Information Technology (C&IT) division recommends and supports SIM/PC communications software for IBM computers and compatibles, and Versaterm software for Macintosh computers. 3. Then Merit asks "Which host?" Type: WSUNET (Enter)

4. "CONNECTED WSUNET" is displayed followed by "Please enter your terminal ID" Type the appropriate

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number and press (Enter). To display a list of terminals and their ID numbers, enter a question mark (?).

5. The WSUNET menu is now displayed.

### CONNECTING TO LUIS

Select LUIS from the WSUNET menu by typing: LUIS(Enter). The "Welcome to LUIS" screen is displayed, showing LUIS hours, your terminal ID, and LUIS logoff instructions. Type again: LUIS(Enter).

For assistance with using LUIS, use the LUIS online Help screens by typing H(Enter) or see the "LUIS SEARCHING Guide" available at library reference desks and on MTS using the command \$copy LUIS:SEARCHING.

### LOGGING OFF

#### ■ From LUIS

First, CLEAR the screen. On the blank screen, type: Logoff(Enter). The WSUNET menu is then displayed.

#### ■ From WSUnet

Dial-up users type: Logoff(Enter) again to return to Merit. Follow the instructions for your communications software to return to DOS.

# Librarians Expanding Horizons

Much of the general public (including hospital staff) are unaware of the duties involved in "Library Work." Now, many librarians have expanded their jobs beyond what was taught in library school even a few years ago. In fact many MHSLA members are probably unaware of the duties of their colleagues. Here are a few examples of interesting tasks performed to supply the informational needs of patrons.

Diane O'Keefe (Wyandotte General Hospital, Wyandotte) is involved in production of a TV program every two weeks for Wyandotte Munciple Cable Service. The health related program is geared to the general public and may be purchased by cable companies in other communities. When the hospital asked for volunteers, Diane quickly responded; along with ten people from the Public Relations and Education Departments. They attended classes for five weeks and Diane learned to work every piece of equipment in the studio. Usually she runs the character generator (putting titles, names, etc. across the screen). Sometimes she runs the camera, the sound board, or the switcher.

Bonnie Swegles (Mercy Hospital, Port Huron) plans, develops, and teaches classes in management development to hospital management staff. She also coordinates continuing medical education. The hospital offers 38 programs each year. Bonnie gets speakers, does literature searches for the speakers, and arranges for any AV hardware or the production of any AV software needed. As she is responsible for all hospital audio visual equipment she coordinates use of the satellite dish. She selects programs needed for her work, obtains lists of programs needed by others, then tapes from the dish. When the hospital is recruiting staff, Bonnie gives tours of the facility and the Port Huron area.

Mollie Lynch (St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, Port Huron) allowed her personal interests and expertise to broaden her job duties. She is sought for consultation by hospital employees or departments on a variety of topics: microcomputer software and hardware (what to buy, how to get started), help in organizing policy and procedure manuals, help in organizing files, consulting on quality assurance and productivity.

Michael Homan (Upjohn Company, Kalamazoo) designs and maintains internal databases and also private files on BRS. The internal databases contain technical reports and proprietary literature; the Library employing indexers and abstractors to process the material. The private files contain published reports and articles dealing with Upjohn and its products. Michael decided the material to be included and the fields needed for the file. He also helped design the load programs. Data is sent to BRS to be loaded. Searching and access is done through BRS

using their commands and capabilities. The Upjohn Library also employs a person with both computer and library science degrees who designs automated library systems.

Bonnie Tanase-Cairns (Sisters of Mercy Health Corporation, Farmington) runs the Learning Resource Center plus is word processing coordinator (a Wang dedicated system). Bonnie oversees the system and trains all new employees in its use.

Glenda Evens (Bronson Methodist Hospital, Kalamazoo) runs the Community Health Information Center. Her collection (including many videocassettes) consists of medical topics geared to the general public. Anyone may use the collection or call for information. Glenda will mail pamphlets or photocopies of articles. Books and videocassettes must be checked out in person. Glenda often connects patients or their families with support groups. She also does person to person networking. If a patient or family member needs to talk to someone with a similar problem Glenda will call the second person. If that person agrees to be a support person Glenda exchanges phone numbers.

# Cooperative Collection Development Program Underway

GMRMLN, the Greater Midwest Regional Medical Library Network, announces the implementation of its Coordinated Cooperative Collection Development Program.

The program's goals include an improvement in the characteristics of the regional collection in terms of quality, quantity, depth, and breadth; the optimization of the use of institutional monetary resources; and an increase in the Region's self-sufficiency by improving its regional ILL fill rate. These goals relate to the program's four components which are as follows:

1. resource analysis — a descriptive evaluation of collections in the Region using the Research Libraries Group Conspectus
2. resource development — identification of serial titles to be purchased and subject areas to be covered in order to either fill gaps or develop greater depth in the Region's collections; funds from NLM and other sources will be used to purchase these materials
3. resource retention — member commitments to retain particular serial titles or develop collections in specific subject areas in order to insure the continued regional availability of information resources
4. a regional collection development policy manual.

The resource analysis phase is currently underway with 22 Resource Libraries (mainly medical school libraries) and 21 Basic Health Science Libraries (mainly hospital libraries) conducting the RLG Conspectus. Conspectus data will be analyzed to identify collection strengths and gaps so that funds can be expended later this year and early next year for the cooperative acquisition of materials. Additional rounds of conspectus evaluation and cooperative acquisition will continue in subsequent years.

Libraries from Michigan currently participating in the program are: Borgess Medical Center, University of Michigan, and Wayne State University.
