However, Kaycee has been invited to conduct workshops at the first 'Fashion Week' in China to be held at about the same time as our conference. Kaycee felt she could not miss the opportunity to be one of the few American representatives at this major event and has cancelled her appearance with us.

Sparrow Hospital and Lansing General Hospital Libraries have successfully created fully integrated library systems with cooperative online catalogs. At both locations, users can view books, journals or audiovisuals held by both libraries. The online catalog was created using a relational database software package called Nutshell Plus. The same software handles full serials control, circulation, acquisitions, and the online catalog; and it was done with a piece of generic software and templates costing less than \$500! St. Lawrence Hospital is in the process of adding their files to this online catalog and should be finished by fall. The MSU members report there is no further progress on the new Science Library Building. Foote Hospital library has moved to larger quarters and their journals and current monographs are in the Nushell Database. Marquette General Hospital's Kevin O'Brien Health Sciences Library has selected Silver Platter for their CD-Rom subscription; limited to the current Medline and Medline backfiles to 1983. The program will be available for medical students, residents and physicians as well as nurses and allied health staff during and after library hours on a 24 hour basis. In addition, Marquette is a member of the Upper Peninsula NOTIS network with current plans to begin retrospective conversion of all library holdings this summer. 

OCLC and GMRMLN: Two Different Routes to SERHOLD

The Report and Recommendations of the GMRMLN Serial Database Committee issued by the Greater Midwest Regional Medical Library Network last fall has raised questions and uncertainties in the minds of many health science librarians in Michigan. The proposed \$ 275 database maintenance fee for participants in the GMRMLN Union List of Serials does not apply to hospital libraries in Michigan. The rationale for this fee is that libraries are using the GMRMLN database as a means of entry into SERHOLD and therefore enjoy the benefits of DOCLINE.

As the diagram below illustrates, Michigan hospital libraries chose a different route in sending serial holdings to NLM for inclusion in SERHOLD and subsequently DOCLINE.



Hospital libraries in Michigan input their serial holdings into the OCLC database, either directly or through a variety of inputting agents such as their local Regions of Cooperation. A tape is produced each February at OCLC and sent to the National Library of Medicine for updating SERHOLD. In fact, Michigan was the test site for this OCLC-NLM interface. SERHOLD is NLM's National Biomedical Serials Holdings database. It contains the serial holdings of over 2,200 libraries. SERHOLD is linked to DOCLINE and provides the data for the automatic routing of interlibrary loan requests through the system.

For a fuller discussion of the original decision to use OCLC rather than GMRMLN to produce MISHULS and also provide the link to DOCLINE, see Sutton and Wolfgram "Using the OCLC Union Listing Component for Statewide Health Sciences Union List of Serials" Bulletin of the Medical Library Association 74(2):104-109, April 1986. It is gratifying to see that the OCLC-NLM link which was still a promise when MISHULS was in its planning stages has indeed proven reliable. It is also interesting that while the original emphasis of MISHULS was on the hard copy union list, the database is now the primary focus as the gateway to two national interlibrary loan systems: OCLC and NLM. That's progress!

ATTAINING HIGHER COMPUTING SPEEDS WITHOUT UPGRADING -by Judy Barnes

I would not have believed it if I had not seen it for myself - My old PC running faster and without adding or changing boards. Using a program called Spinrite, the efficiency of one PC in my library was increased by 420% and another by 120%. Spinrite checks the interleave factor of the fixed disk and if possible, makes changes in the factor or performs a low level format to increase machine efficiency. A similar shareware program called Checkdisk is also available.

Another program you should check out if your aging PC does not have "disk cashing" capabilities is a shareware program called DCache. "DCache is a hard disk cache that speeds up your computer by cutting the disk access time by as much as 50%. It reduces response time by keeping the most recently used data from the disk in its own reserved section of RAM." DCache is now included in the MHSLA DEMO Disk Library or is available for downloading from many BBS's. Here's a reference which tells all about it:
