Munson Medical Center was surveyed by JCAHO on June 2-4. Our survey team had last been in Texas and Indiana, so we had little knowledge of what to expect, other than that they were a "no-nonsense" team. Needless to say, I had a busy week in between MLA and June 2 getting our paperwork in order: Policies and Procedures, Safety, Continuing Education, etc.!!

Those of you at the JCAHO session in Washington at MLA heard that the Library could expect at least a token visit at their next reaccreditation inspection. In years past, sometimes I received a visit, sometimes not!

I was pleasantly surprised to see the Library on the scheduled itinerary for the second day of the visit. The administrator on the team, C. Weeks, spent 45 minutes to an hour chatting with me in my office and touring the Library.

Because I have received phone calls from colleagues who have JCAHO coming soon, I've briefly listed some of Mr. Week's questions:

- Who are our users (physicians only or all health professionals)?
- What's the educational background of staff?
- How is the Library funded and what is my budget for collection development?
- Asked specific questions about number of literature searches performed and how document delivery was provided.
- Toured facility and seemed pleased with physical plant and technology.

It was an informal, positive discussion with one of our Vice-Presidents in attendance. The Survey went well and we were told we would receive full accreditation.

MHSLA CONFERENCE UPDATE:

Looking to the Future Keeping the Best from the Past

Be sure to reserve October 13-15 for the Annual MHSLA Educational Conference. This year's meeting will be held at the Mayflower Hotel in Plymouth, Michigan and hosted by the Metropolitan Detroit Medical Library Group. The MHSLA Education Committee has finalized plans for the program. Highlights include two MLA CE courses, "AIDS: Concepts and Resources" and "Basic Library Management" on Tuesday, then on Wednesday, the keynote address "Preserving the Past: Looking to the Future" plus an interactive workshop on library operations by Bob Cheshier, Director of the Cleveland Health Sciences Library. On Thursday morning, Evonne Alhaddad of InterAct will present a workshop on resolving conflict and listening, and Elizabeth Siegel and Kim Goldman from GMR NN/LM will present the Grateful MED "Train the Trainer" class.

The conference is a real bargain this year for those attending all three days! A special \$150 rate includes MLA CE course registration, the two day conference fee, and a dinner/mystery theater production at Genitti's Restaurant in Northville on Wednesday night. Thursday afternoon will provide opportunities for both formal and informal interaction with your colleagues through a contributed paper session and roundtable discussion groups. Papers scheduled include: "Institutional vs. Professional Loyalty" by Lynn Sorensen Sutton, (Wayne State University), "Bibliographic Instruction Using MEDLINE on CD-ROM" by Maureen Watson (Ferris State College of Optometry), "Labor Union Activity: Its Impact on Michigan Health Sciences Libraries" by Carol Aebli (Kalamazoo Psychiatric Hospital), and "Interlibrary Loan Inter-Relationships of Michigan DOCLINE Libraries" by Lea Ann McGaugh (McLaren Hospital). Topics for the roundtable discussion groups are 1) "MSU/Hospital Libraries Interaction", 2) "MLA Credentialing", 3) "Support Staff", 4) "One-Person Libraries/Managing with Limited Resources", and 5) "Favorite Forms/Tools".

Arlene Farber Sirkin received an MBA from the Wharton School in marketing with a concentration in planning. She also has an MA in Library and Information Services from Columbia University, an MA in Communications from the New School for Social Research and a BA in Education from Simmons College.

Maximizing Customer Satisfaction will focus on the users of your facility--your customers. Future funding, and in some cases, survival of your facility depends on providing quality customer service. In the past, some

information centers have not always focused on the delivery of customer satisfying service. Yet studies show that, on average, it is five to fifteen times harder to get a new customer than to retain an old one.

For special libraries, particularly those with very specialized user populations, there is a limited supply of new users and clients. This seminar will focus on what is involved in improving your customer satisfaction quotient.

- Measuring customer satisfaction in your information center
- Developing a customer service program for your organization
- Is the customer always right?
- How to truly integrate a customer service philosophy into your library
