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PRESIDENT'S PAGE

This week, I completed the paperwork for staff internet accounts on the hospital's new network connection. I've been asked to describe what communication would occur that is vital to our mission. While a valid question, it would have been much more difficult to answer if I had not already had an opportunity to explore the Internet.

More than 50% of MHSLA's membership has Internet access. One of the first things I did when I opened my account was to send out a "mass mailing" to the members whose addresses were listed in the directory asking what discussion lists they found most useful.

First is MEDLIB-L (listserv@ubvm.cc.buffalo.edu). Health Sciences librarians often work in solitary situations without access to colleagues to share interests and concerns. Over 1200 of us on this medical librarians' list help each other find those elusive news reports, discuss Joint Commission requirements and surveys, and share information about health-related internet sites. The Medical Library Association recently announced it will assume the administration of the list--a step forward, we think, in the recognition of the list as an important form of communication for medical librarians worldwide.

Other favorites are PACS-L (listserv@UHUPVMI1>UH.EDU), a discussion group relating to public access computer systems: ILL-L(listproc@usc.edu), for interlibrary loans; and SERIALST (listserv@uvmvm.uvm.edu). I've recently subscribed to LITA L (listserv@uicvm.cc.uic.edu), a discussion group sponsored by the ALA affiliate related to library information technology. Support staff may find (list.proc@u.washington.edu) LIBSUP-L of interest. The reference librarians' discussion list (LIBREF-L, listserv@kentvm.kent.edu) is fascinating, but has about as many messages as MEDLIB-L; I had to cut back on this one when I found my life consumed with discussion lists!

Some library product vendors offer discussion lists for their customers: SilverPlatter (SPIN-L), listserv@silverplatter.com) and Data Trek professional (DTIPRO, listserv@ohionet.org) are with problems; and ARIE-L has provides a list of medical libraries with ARIEL services as well as discussions of equipment compatibility and common transmission problems.

Various members mentioned subject-specific discussion groups, such as GRIEFNET, NETTRAIN, and HMATRIX-L. To subscribe to the NIH Grant guide, subscribe to NIHGDE-L at listserv@list.nih.gov. Recently instructions were posted on MEDLIB-L for finding listservs on various topics by sending a message to listserv@american.edu; leave the subject line blank and on the first line of the message type the command: list global / textword, filling in the textword (or partial textword) to be searched. The example given was for locating a listserv on aging by searching:

list global /aging

list global /gerontol

list global /geriatric

Finally, a number of regional discussion lists help us keep up on local interest. University of Michigan sponsors a multitpe list for Michigan libraries: Michlib-1

GMR/NN/LM sponsors GMRLIST (listserv@uicvm..cc.uic.edu); the Midwest Chapter of the Medical Library Association has just started MCMLA-L(listproc@apollo.it.luc.edu). This month, the MHLSA Board authorized the Ad-Hoc Committee on Technology for Document Delivery and Interlibrary Loan to proceed with the creation of a listserv for the MHSLA membership; watch for an announcement when this service actually becomes available.

Access to the internet is becoming much easier, with commercial vendors such as America Online, library vendors such as Michigan Library consortium, and healthcare associations such as the Michigan Health and Hospital Association offering access services. I would like to encourage each of you to explore these and other resources, and to share them with fellow MHSLA members.

Internet Video Available

NN/LM, New England Region and the University of Connecticut Health Center released a video titled "Internet Healthcare Resources and Information Management." The nine minute video features interviews with C. Everett Koop, former Surgeon General, Paul Schyve of JCAHO, and Gerard Robilotti, CEO of Danbury Hospital, Danbury,. CT. The Northern Sphere

Pat Wolfgram from the MidMichigan Regional Medical Center was fortunate enough to attend the Canadian Health Libraries Association, (CHLA), Annual Conference this year and passed on some of the thoughts of the keynote speaker, Mary Dykstra, Ph.D., professor at the School of Library and Information Science, Dalhousie University in Halifax, Nova Scotia.

Dykstra identifies a knowledge-based economy that regards information as a product, or "non-rival" commodity. "Non-rival" describing information that once purchased or provided free is owned by both the buyer and seller. She also foresees a market where information producers deal directly with consumers and librarians will become more innovative to survive.
