### **Mark Your Calendars**

The Michigan Health Sciences Libraries Association's 24th Annual Educational Conference is scheduled for September 10th -12th, 1997. The site of this year's meeting is the prestigious Dearborn Inn.

The Dearborn Inn was built by automotive mogul Henry Ford I and first opened its doors in 1932. Located adjacent to the then Ford Airport, the hotel was originally designed with the world traveler of that era in mind, whether arriving via car, airplane, or zeppelin. Currently owned and operated by Marriott Hotels, this recently refurbished hotel provides colonial charm in an elegant setting. All the rooms throughout the facility feature historic reproductions of Early American furnishings and decor. Besides the guest rooms in the Main Inn, there are two Colonial Lodges and five individual Colonial Homes. Each of the homes is an authentic replica of the birthplace

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or residence of a famous figure in American history.

The Dearborn Inn is located across the street from Greenfield Village and the Henry Ford Museum. This year's special event will take place at the Village and will include a horse-drawn buggy tour of the village and dinner at the Eagle Tayern.

The educational portion of the conference is shaping up nicely. As yet the classes and programs have not been announced. CE courses will be offered on Wednesday, September 10th. Lunch in the garden will be included. Thursday, September 11th, will start off with the general business meeting in the morning, then two programs in the afternoon. Friday, September 12th will have two programs in the morning and afternoon. Either Thursday or Friday will include a luncheon in the Alexandria Ballroom.

The 24th Annual Educational Conference will be one for the history books. Hope to see you there.

# Internet: an Integral Part of Library Operations

While Amberg Library has only had Internet access for about 15 months, we've come to rely on it for all aspects of library operations. Recent examples:

- Acquisitions: A physician asked us to purchase software based on a year-old flyer. The phone and fax numbers on the flyer were both out of service. An AltaVista search of the World Wide Web turned up its new address, phone and fax in another state. <a href="http://www.altavista.digital.com">http://www.altavista.digital.com</a>
- We also regularly consult Doody's <a href="http://www.doody.com/">http://www.doody.com/</a> and Login Brothers' <a href="http://www.lb.com/">http://www.lb.com/</a>.
- Cataloging: Using FTP, our cataloger submits her orders for cataloging records to Marcive, Inc., and can pick up the ready-to-load MARC records within 24 hours. (To set up this service contact Marcive, Inc. at 1-800-531-7678;

purchase of software required to submit requests via FTP.)

- Circulation: We determined the current replacement cost for Audio-Digest tapes in order to bill delinquent borrowers by looking at the Audio-Digest homepage: <a href="http://www.audio-digest.org/">http://www.audio-digest.org/</a>>.
- Collection Development: For help in writing our collection development policies, we searched the Web for other libraries' policies. (We found university but not hospital library collection development policies online.)
- Consumer-level reference services:
  Consumer Library staff assisted the mother of a terminally ill child to find a local support group by searching the Web. They were also able to find appropriate information on "spherocytosis," a subject too specific to be covered in their collection of lay literature.
- Document Delivery: We print MMWR directly from the CDC homepage rather than using our scant shelf space to store back issues and using staff time to check in, file, copy and refile issues. <a href="http://www.cdc.gov/">http://www.cdc.gov/>
- Interlibrary Loan: We've begun using CCC Online to report and pay royalties for interlibrary loans borrowed in excess of CONTU guidelines. <a href="http://www.copyright.com/">http://www.copyright.com/</a> We also accept our users' requests for interlibrary loan through e-mail.
- Reference: Out-of-scope topics can now be covered with a search of the Web. We have able to direct users to college homepages rather than maintaining catalogs; find poetry about children for our public relations department; and come up with a brief history of "Santa Claus" for the Toastmasters' club.

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- Serials: We participate in BACKMED, a duplicates exchange list for medical and nursing titles. Subscribe through listserv@sun.readmore.com

- Technology: "Collaboratories" and "data mining" are concepts mentioned in passing in recent seminars and listsery discussions. Too new to be in reference works, these topics on the cutting edge of technology and research may one day affect hospitals and hospital libraries, and they may already be important to academic librarians. Curious? Look at "data mining" at <a href="http://www.acm.org/">http://www.acm.org/</a> as the topic of a special December issue of "Communications of the ACM." University of Michigan's collaboratory work is described at <a href="http://www.crew.umich.edu/">,</a>, and the Triad project <a href="http://camis.stanford.edu/projects/triad">http://camis.stanford.edu/projects/triad</a>. html> is just one of several in the area of medicine.
