President's Column

You should have received the preliminary announcement about our 1997 MHSLA Annual Educational Conference by now. The setting at the Dearborn Inn is beautiful and Greenfield Village and Henry Ford Museum are right around the corner. The conference is a very economical way to get both a formal CE course and also CE credits from the daily workshops. Networking with your colleagues at the state conference is also much more practical and fruitful than at the larger national conferences. I look forward to seeing all of you there.

I just received word that the Federal government, under the Telecommunications Act of 1996, will be offering subsidized telecommunications services for libraries (including medical). The program is called the Universal Service Fund (USF). Several organizations will be providing information, including the Michigan Library Consortium, the Library of Michigan, and the Merit network. Potential savings on telecommunication services range from 20% to 90% and the proposal is to base the discount you may receive on the percentage your school system uses the Federal lunch program. Merit and the other organizations are holding an informational meeting at Central Michigan University on May 15. For more information about the USF and the May 15 meeting, visit the Merit web site at http://www.merit.edu or call one of the other organizations. The fund is \$2.25 billion per year for the entire United States and will be distributed on a first-come, first-served basis. This program has the potential to save our libraries money on Internet access but you must be prepared to act quickly.

Information, Innovation, Illumination

MHSLA's 24th Annual Educational Conference is coming upon us fast. The dates have been set, September 10-12, 1997. The location has been decided, the Dearborn Inn, one of only four four-star hotels in Michigan. The theme of this year's conference will be *Information*, *Innovation*, *Illumination*. The educational portion of the program has now been determined.

Wednesday, registrants will have an opportunity to choose one of two continuing education courses. Both courses are 7-8 contact hours of MLA or SLA credit. Randy Bauer, President of Leadership Training Associates, will be teaching the class "Building Assertiveness for Professional and Personal Success". This course will cover topics including success through assertion, power and politics, negotiation, creating an information audit and dealing with chaos. The second offering is from JCAHO and is entitled "Practical Strategies for Implementing Management of Information Standards". Bother classes should prove to be illuminating and informative.

Thursday morning begins with Dearborn

Inn's "Signature Continental" breakfast followed by Dr. Mika, from Wayne State University, as the keynote speaker, then the annual Business Meeting. After the meeting has concluded members may stroll through the exhibit area viewing the wares of the vendors and the posters of the members. Around noon, conference goers have a choice of lunch on their own or attending the MACHIS meeting (a box lunch may be purchased at the time of registration). In the afternoon there is a choice of Ann Donahue from the Library of Michigan presenting "Internet Policies and Providing Internet Access: Security & Logistics with Netscape" or Joseph Mika from Wayne State University and Marianne Hertzell, executive Director, Michigan Library Association, speaking on the "Leadership Academy: Libraries and the Management Culture". Thursday evening's special event will be held at the historic Greenfield Village and will include horse-drawn carriage tours and dinner at the Eagle Tavern.

Friday morning has a choice of two concurrent sessions. The first session will be the "Virtual Journals Panel" chaired by Sandra Swanson. This panel will cover issues regarding electronic journals including costs, infrastructure, user resistance, document delivery and resource sharing. The second morning session will be "Computer Basics: Inside the PC". This session will give attendees an opportunity to examine the "guts" of the personal computer, how to take it apart, and more importantly, how to most it back together. Lunch will be served in the elegant Alexandria Ballroom. At lunch on Friday, a special treat from OVID Technologies "OVID Lunch and Learn". In the afternoon, Mark Crafton, Director, Health Care Quality, will be presenting on "MHA Aggregate Data Databases for JCAHO: External Knowledge." The second choice of the afternoon will be "SLA Knowledge Management: Getting Out of the Box." This 90 minute video will be facilitated by SLA speaker and author Linda McFadden of Watershed Strategies.

Preview of the 1997 MHSLA Educational Conference

Salute & Salutations to my fellow members:

As President-elect, I 've been privy to the plans for this year's conference. Let me bring you up to date.

I knew that planning a conference was involved and this year has been no exception. The local arrangements cochairpersons, Joan Emahiser and Diane O'Keefe, have been busy for more than a year. With multiple site options before them, the local group (MDMLG) wisely began planning early. Through a process of elimination, they narrowed the site to the Dearborn Inn, a "4-star" inn, which offered the MHSLA a discounted rate of \$109.00 (normal rates are \$144 for a single and \$150 for a double). While the price may seem high to some, considering the area and the caliber of the lodging, it is actually a good value. If you need to cut costs, you could double with a friend and reduce your lodging cost by splitting the charges (contact Chris Hunt if you need help finding another interested partner). Aside from its high quality lodging, the Dearborn Inn is also located close to the Ford Museum and Greenfield Village making them a feasible choice for our Thursday evening special activity - a horse-drawn carriage tour of Greenfield Village and dinner at the Eagle Tavern. Guest passes may be purchased at registration time. For those of you interested in shopping, Fairlane, a multistory shopping complex is also within easy driving distance.

For our educational activities, Stephanie John, educational chair has put together a powerful and valuable combination of informational programs to stimulate our mental neurons and help in job performance & functionality. Since past conference expenses have resulted in a loss of funds, our Executive Board has voted to raise the price of this year's conference fees to more properly reflect the cost of administering this undertaking. The conference even at the increased prices is still projected to lose money. The inclusive fee (for members only) is \$325.00. I know that this is a steep jump from last year, however, please remember that this does include the CE programs. Please remember that our CE programs are a bargain, at MLA, \$150.00 is the price for a four hour class and we are charging that for an eight hour class. Everyone that I know, (including myself) would like to get a bargain, and that is why we tried our best to put together a quality program. The rest of the new price breakdowns are as follows:

This piece is a brief analysis of the MHSLA 1996 conference "Capitalizing on Information". The titles refers to the fact that librarinaship, and most specifically health science librarianship, has been a mid-life career change for me. Sadly, it is also a comment on the time it has taken me to write this review (my apologies to the conference committee), I knw what I wanted to say, and on a weekly basis I would review it in my mind. It was difficult concretizing it.

The most helpful and exciting part of the conference was listening to the stories (and tales of woe) of the conference participants. Thursday's activities, while interesting, appeared to be of more use to the active librarian. My interaction with vendors was minimal -- as I couldn't comment on what system my library uses, etc. I did take as much information as I could for future use. The Riverboat cruise disproved my sister's theory that librarians do not have a sense of humor. Friday's two workshops on marketing and non-medical resources provided some good information. I did, however, disagree with the image consultant about color. In order to work effectively, I find that I must be comfortable in my clothes no matter what color they are.

The crux of the difficulty I had is that for me (a student), the conference was interesting and confirmed my choice of a career changes, but that it was fantasy land. I returned to Detroit with the knowledge that hospitals are merging and downsizing and that jobs are blowin' in the wind. In spite of this, I will continue to pursue my dream.

Many residency programs and medical schools are switching to evidence-based medicine for teaching. The class filled in Seattle so M-MHSL will be sponsoring the MLA Class "Evidence-Based Medicine: Panning for Gold" on **June 13, 1997** at Michigan State University Libraries from 8:30 am - 5:00 pm. Cost will be \$75.00.

Learn the principles of evidence-based medicine, an approach to clinical practice in which clinicians base their decisions and actions on appropriate evidence from health care research literature, in addition to expertise and patient circumstances. Discover the research approaches to the therapy, diagnosis, etiology, and prognosis of medical conditions and illness. Explore MEDLINE search approaches for retrieving these types of articles in a live demonstration.
