# **DOCLINE News From NLM**

Elhill will be gone in September 1998. Version 1.0 of the web DOCLINE will be available. In June 1999, version 2.0 of DOCLINE will be implemented. It will be ILL protocol compliant. One advantage of the ISO standard will be the ability to sign into other vendors such as OCLC and exchange messages back and forth between the two systems. Electronic payment will be an option in the new system.

The FTS2000 number will be available until the new system is up.

The DOCLINE manual is online (http://www.nlm.nih.gov/psd/cas/docline /contents.html).

RELAIS is the document delivery process at NLM. With its implementation, ILLs now take 20 hours instead of 60 hours. Ariel requests are the fastest and can be received with in 2-8 hours. Fax is almost as fast. If a request is a clinical emergency, it should be coded 2029C.

### **MISHULS Changes**

The Board of MHSLA has decided to pay for the input of serials changes this year for all MISHULS participants because of the change in the way the National Library of Medicine is willing to accept updates to SERHOLD.

NLM will no longer accept OCLC tapes of MISHULS (or any other group) updates. All updates to SERHOLD will be done through one library in each state. Michigan State will be our inputting agent. Because of the difficulty in knowing how many changes there will be with all of our participants, the Board voted to pay MSU for doing the updating this

year only. It is expected that most libraries will be able to update their own holdings in the future. If not, MSU will have an idea of the costs and will be able to give libraries a quote for doing the updating.

Leslie Behm has requested that everyone who wants their holdings in MISHULS updated should send the updates to her as soon as possible.

There will not be an edition of MISHULS this year since we do not have to purchase the OCLC output.

If you are planning to update your holdings in OCLC, you will need to do so through your usual input agent or your usual input method.

The Document Delivery Committee appreciates the efforts of the Board in helping through this transition.

#### **Nursing Times**

A supplement on Clinical Effectiveness is appended to the July 15, 1998 issue of Nursing Times (volume 94 number 28). There is no supplement number or authorship statement, but the contents of the 10 sections (31 pages) look excellent, including: 1. the clinical effectiveness process, 2. improving clinical practice, 3 searching the literature, 4. critically appraising literature, 5. designing and carrying out a clinical audit, 6. preparing a proposal for a clinical audit, 7. changing clinical practice, 8. designing a research study, 9. preparing a proposal for research, and 10. writing and publishing on clinically effective practice.

medicine and public health, some professionals and organizations in the two health sectors have identified powerful strategies for dealing with the problems they face. Medicine & Public Health:

#### **Benchmarking Tool Kit**

This useful tool kit sponsored by the Canadian HealthLibraries Association / Association des bibliotheques de la sante du Canada is now available for purchase. This document will be of interest to any librarian who is pursuing continuous quality improvement or performance measurement. Benchmarking is a key tool for continuous quality improvement. Using the guidelines for data collection and performance measurement in this Tool Kit, health and other special libraries will be able to compare their own performance with pilot project data; benchmark against their own performance over time; or benchmark against one or more partners. The Tool Kit was prepared by Joanne Marshall and Penney Kirby at the Faculty of Information Studies at the University of Toronto in close collaboration with members of the CHLA/ABSC Benchmarking Task Force. Over a year of development and testing went into the tool kit, which includes precise definitions and detailed, east to follow instructions for gathering consistent and reliable data. ### **PubMed Updates**

On August 3, 1998, NLM redesigned the way PubMed stores and retrieves information. This will improve search time. A search that took 18 seconds now will be executed in 2 seconds.

The online help manual for PubMed was updated April 1998. The url is <a href="http://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/PubMed/pubmedhelp.html">http://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/PubMed/pubmedhelp.html</a>

Planned enhancements to the system include:

- 1) Redesign of the Advanced Search Page to be able to limit to human, age groups, English only articles, etc. The journal subsets (AIM, Nursing, Dental) will also be available for limiting.
- 2) The Modify Current Query will be replaced with a Search History with numbered statements showing the postings for each term. Combing statement numbers using Boolean operators will be possible.
- 3) Additional display options will be available including a user defined option.
- 4) A Sort option is also planned.
- 5) A 'cubby' service is being developed where individuals can store saved searches, individual preferences, and information based on the preferences such as tailored print commands.
