Ferris to Host Events in Recognition of Native American Heritage Month

BIG RAPIDS - Ferris State University will celebrate Native American Heritage Month with opportunities to explore the history and traditions of Native Americans.

The university's month-long celebration features events designed to develop an understanding of Native American culture in Michigan, explore perceptions, stereotypes and accurate representations of modern Native Americans, discover the history and evolution of food, feasting and harvest celebrations, and experience the lifestyle of a Michigan Indian tribal community.

"The Native American Heritage Month events provide opportunities to engage and learn more about a part of our American culture," said Michael Wade, assistant director of the university's Office of Multicultural Student Services.

The free events are open to students, faculty and staff, and the Big Rapids community. The celebration is co-sponsored by the Circle of Tribal Nations and FSUBuntu registered student organizations, Ferris' Office of International Education, and the FSU Symphony Band and the Office of Instrumental Concert Ensembles.

Michigan Tribal Community Tour and Spirit Feast

When: 3-9 p.m. Friday, Nov. 1, Mount Pleasant

What: Ferris students are invited to join Circle of Tribal Nations members to visit the seventh generation program at Elijah Elk Cultural Center and the 2013 Spirit Feast at the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribal Community in Mount Pleasant. The event is free, but students must RSVP to OMSS by calling (231) 591-2617 or visiting the office in FLITE, Suite 159. Seating is limited.

"Our Fires Still Burn" documentary screening, Q&A session

When: 5-7:30 p.m. Monday, Nov. 4, College of Business, Room 111

What: Producer and director Audrey Geyer will show her 60-minute documentary about the lives of contemporary Native American role models in the Midwest. Following the screening, a

question-and-answer session will be held with Geyer and Native Americans featured in the film.
