Super Searcher, 4 CE credits

MSU Main Library, Basement Instruction Room**

Instructor: Max Anderson, Technology Coordinator, NN/LM GMR

This hands-on course focuses on the advanced search features of web search engines and the cutting edge of searching. Participants will use various search engines, compare the features and utility of each and develop search strategies that will increase the precision and scope of their searching. The students will have discussions and exercises as a part of the class. The class includes: brief discussions of web search engines, indexes and hybrids of the two. More in-depth discussion and exercises will cover commercialism and how it influences searching, finding current events information with search engines, specialized databases for special needs, real-time searching and topics suggested by the participants.

People without supervisory experience often wonder how to get leadership experience to qualify for a future management role, and thus enhance their career development opportunities. In response to the growing need to develop library leaders to replace retiring baby-boomers, a task force of the Leadership and Management Section of the Medical Library Association has identified experience and qualification expectations that current upper library managers hold. These are somewhat different from beliefs about skills that the applicant pool holds. Leadership opportunities exist all around us, in and out of our professional responsibilities and places of work. This class will help each participant to identify leadership skills s/he wants to develop, and then identify non-supervisory leadership opportunities that currently exist for them in their own circles of influence. Participants will use in-class discussion and worksheets to create a personal action plan and timeline to obtain leadership experience that they desire.

Cows with Names Make More Milk - Human-Animal Interaction on the Farm

Mention the human-animal bond and most people immediately think of their loyal pet dog or amusing cat or spunky horse. The positive influence pet animals have on their humans has been noted for decades, and even recorded by Florence Nightingale. Studies using various methods show that these animals can enhance mood, self-esteem and self-confidence and decrease blood pressure, stress, and anger. However, often ignored by urban and suburban dwellers are the interactions and relationships between the thousands of animals raised for food and their human caretakers. Caring for farm animals is a privilege most Americans never experience. If I say “cow” – do you think big, dumb, black and white mild machines? Those of us who work daily with cattle know the fallacy of this common interpretation. Understanding how cattle think, what they see, how they move and how they interact with each other, their human caretakers and other species is the key to providing for optimum welfare.

Keeping Up With PubMed

With a hands-on approach, this three-hour class will introduce and review the updated PubMed interface and My NCBI options. Attendees will learn how to use the features of PubMed effectively, including ones that have relocated and others that are new. Bring your laptops and improve your skills to formulate basic search strategies; working with various display formats; revise and refine searches using the MeSH database; use My NCBI to personalize PubMed with filters and to store searches and citations; and identify the value of special features and tools such as Related Articles, Single Citation Matcher, Topic-Specific Queries and the Journals database. Demonstrations by the instructor, time for individual practice and lots of examples and answered questions make this class a valuable resource and experience.

This class will not take place in a computer lab. Wireless access is available and attendees should bring their own laptops.

Instruction by Design: Creating Effective Instruction **3 CE Credits** **Room 106**

Librarians spend hours working with individuals or groups teaching information literacy skills, such as locating resources, searching databases and evaluating information. How do we know if these efforts are working for our learners? What can we do, in our role as educators, to increase our instructional effectiveness, and have our users understand the need to develop information seeking skills and critically think about the information they find on the internet and through other resources.

In this program Instruction by Design, we will explore the ADDIE Model, a systematic instructional design model, and work together to apply the steps in developing and delivering effective instruction to our learners. We will explore ideas such as: When is instructional intervention necessary? How can we better understand our learners? How do you select an appropriate delivery system? What's appropriate active learning for adult learners? How can we provide effective point-of-need asynchronous instruction without requiring a lot of training or expensive software? How do we assess our instructional effectiveness? Through hands-on activities, participants will explore solutions to their instruction challenges and together we will develop solutions to deliver effective instruction.

40 Years of MDMLG: Healthy Professional Group = Healthy Libraries

The Metropolitan Detroit Medical Library Group (MDMLG) can trace its roots to the Biological Sciences Group established by the Michigan Chapter of the Special Libraries Association in 1946. During the 1960's, several plans came into fruition including the production of a serial locator tool, the creation of a union catalog of monographs, and the establishment of an active interlibrary loan network. The group began the process of formal organization and chose its current name in 1970. By tracing the history of MDMLG over the past 40 years, this poster will illustrate how membership in a professional group can strengthen libraries and librarians. The poster will highlight key documents and photographs residing in the MDMLG archives at the Walter P. Reuther Library, Wayne State University. From its formal organization, the heyday of the MLA conferences in the 80's, numerous group initiatives, and many continuing educational opportunities, MDMLG is a vital part of the health of medical libraries and librarians in the metropolitan Detroit area.

Collection Fitness -- How the University of Michigan Health Sciences Library Is Becoming "Healthier"
