PHARMACY EXAMINATION. We will act as host to the Michigan Board of Pharmacy Tuesday and Wednesday this week, when they will be on campus to give the Pharmacy Board examinations. Fourteen of our own recent graduates, as well as a number of graduates from other colleges, will write the examinations, which will be administered in the new Ferris East Building.

On Tuesday, DECEMBER 11, at 10 o'clock Dr. Lee M. Thurston will address our students and faculty at an all-college assembly. The public is also invited. Dr. Thurston is Michigan's Superintendent of Public Instruction and a member, ex officio, of the Ferris Institute Board of Control. One of the most outstanding men in public education in the United States, Dr. Thurston will bring a message of value and interest to all of us.

BUILDING PROGRESS. West Building: Bad weather, deer hunting season, and the Thanksgiving holiday have slowed down work during the past ten days. However, the gypsum installation for the roof has been completed, making the roof ready for final felting, tarring, and gravel application. Brick work is moving along, as are plumbing and electrical installations. The dumb-waiter has been completely roughed in on the first and second floors.

East Building: Classes will meet in the south one-story wing of the Ferris East Building tomorrow, Tuesday, November 27. This will be a red-letter day in the history of Ferris Institute. The East Building represents the first major building project on the campus since 1929, when the Alumni Building was constructed. As other sections of the East Building are completed, classes will be moved in from the barracks. It is expected that all classes except the Trades and Industry program will be moved into the new building before the present term is ended.
