Innovational Learning and Research Grand Opening

On Friday we held the grand opening celebration for the College of Pharmacy's new Center for Innovational Learning and Research, located at 25 Michigan Street in Grand Rapids. The facility consolidates and improves learning opportunities for third and fourth-year Pharmacy students.

Ferris graduates more than half of the practicing pharmacists in Michigan, so this facility is an important resource for the entire state. We are very excited by the opportunities for collaboration that now exist between Ferris and the Van Andel Institute, the Helen DeVos Children's Hospital, the Lemmen-Holton Cancer Pavilion, the entire Spectrum Health System and others. With the Center for Innovational Learning and Research being situated in Grand Rapids' "Medical Mile," we are now a part of one of the most important health-care corridors in the nation.

Michigan lawmakers have taken up legislation that is a direct result of concern over student debt and the length of time it takes for degree completion, and President Obama has also brought these issues to the forefront by statements he has made regarding access to education.

These are questions of great concern to our University. I am very proud of the work we have done to help constrain costs at Ferris, and these forums will provide an opportunity to look specifically at these issues within the larger framework of the challenges that exist with funding of public institutions of higher education.

I hope you can find time to attend one of these sessions. I look forward to outlining some of the most important trends regarding student debt and degree completions, as well as to answering some of the insightful questions that campus members always bring forward at these sessions. Most importantly, I want to engage each of you in considering how we can best help our students.
