President's Memorandum to Faculty and Staff

Office of the President November 16, 2009

Support for college students has become a topic of significant interest in Michigan this past week. Ferris State University's action to cover the funding shortfall of the Michigan Promise Grant and Michigan Competitive Scholarships for our students received significant favorable reaction throughout the state and country. This action provides financial assistance, for fall semester, to 1,312 Ferris students who expected to receive the Michigan Promise Grant, and to 616 students who were to receive Michigan Competitive Scholarships.

Remaining funds from the \$1.4 million of federal stimulus will used to provide additional financial aid for students for Spring Semester 2010. Please encourage students who need additional financial assistance to contact the Financial Aid office. When possible, we will refigure students' financial aid requests to help them receive any additional support to which they may be entitled.

Pedestrian Safety

The recent pedestrian fatality of a Ferris student is a tragic reminder of the importance of pedestrian and vehicular safety both on and off campus. Because safety for our students, employees and guests is an issue of utmost importance, the University's Strategic Planning and Resource Council has recommended a Pedestrian Safety Task Force be created with the charge to

- Solicit input broadly from the campus and community regarding observations and experiences with pedestrian safety and possible solutions to these challenges.
- Consider possible actions with streets controlled by the University and through
 consultation with appropriate city and state officials, with streets controlled by the City
 of Big Rapids and the Michigan Department of Transportation.
- Identify and report recommendations with estimated costs and a potential timeline for these actions.

The task force will study current conditions, consider future developments as identified in the Campus Master Plan, and identify ways to improve pedestrian safety through education, physical modifications to the campus and other means.

Until then, please know that our growing enrollment means that there are more pedestrians and more cars. As you walk the campus, please be aware of your surroundings. It is easy to become distracted by conversations with friends both in person and on a cell phone. And as drivers, we need to obey all traffic laws and without exception, yield the right-of-way at crosswalks. We want everyone in the Ferris community to learn and work in the safest possible environment.

Budget Forums

In addition to the two previously announced forums on the budget – the first taking place today, November 16th from 11:00 a.m.-12:30 p.m. and the second tomorrow, Tuesday, November 17th from 1:30-3:00 p.m. – there will be a third forum on Tuesday, December 1st, from 4:00-5:30 p.m. The first two will take place in the Rankin Center's Centennial Dining Room and the last will be in Rankin Center's Founders' Room.

The entire state budget situation has been a long and difficult process, with lawmakers unable to find consensus while revenues have continued to fall. The action, or inaction, at the state level has created difficult choices for Michigan universities.

In these sessions we will consider together the current budget situation, clarify the actions taken by the state in this year's budget, and talk about what lies ahead for both this and next year's budget. I look forward to seeing you there.
