Two Kendall College of Art and Design students recently received special recognition from the Windgate Foundation. Fifty-four schools nationwide were invited to submit applications from two students each for fellowships in the area of sculpture and functional art. Students were then invited to complete the online application, upload ten images of their work, and a proposal on how this award would advance their artistic goals and career. From these 81 entries, the Windgate Foundation awarded 10 fellowships, and two went to Kendall College of Art and Design students. Tim Maddox and Chul-Yeon Park were each awarded \$15,000 fellowships. Both Tim and Chul-Yeon are graduating this Saturday. Tim plans to pursue a studio career and then possibly attend graduate school. He is already represented by galleries and has a number of private commissions. Congratulations to Coach Brad Bedortha and the women's golf team. Yesterday the Ferris women's golf team won the NCAA East Regional Championship held at the Katke Golf Course.
