President's Memorandum to Faculty and Staff

At the Opening of School Convocation on August 23rd these ideas will be presented again with more of a focus on faculty.

Transitions

Since the fall of 1998, Dr. Richard Cochran has served our University admirably as Chief Information Officer. Recently he visited with me regarding his desire to direct his full attentions to the library. Reluctantly I have agreed to his request. I very much appreciate the leadership Richard has shown for our campus and his willingness to tackle some of the truly difficult issues associated with information technology support. Dr. Cochran has shared with me his plans to pursue some very interesting projects with the library, including a state-wide digital initiative with Library Deans, electronic initiatives associated with our campus portal, and increased support for information literacy on campus.

I want to thank Dr. Cochran for his wonderful efforts for our university in technology and look forward to his work on these exciting projects. On July 1st Scott Thede will assume Richard's technology support oversight responsibilities, serving as Academic Computer Support Manager and reporting to John Urbanick in Information Systems and Telecommunications. I appreciate very much that Scott is willing to accept this position and look forward to his strong leadership for information technology support efforts on our campus.

On Tuesday the Academic Senate selected its leadership for the 2004-2005 academic year. The President is Adnan Dakkuri; Vice President is Bob Loesch; and the Secretary is David Aiken. Other board members are Jim Bandstra, Mike Cron, and Leonard Johnson. I look forward to working with Adnan and his colleagues for our University. At the same time I want to extend my sincere thanks and appreciation to Bill Papo and this year's executive board for their wonderful efforts. They and their colleagues on the Academic Senate have worked very hard for Ferris and our academic programs. I am especially thankful for their assistance during this my first year at Ferris.

Legislative Hearing

On Wednesday I presented to the House Appropriations Higher Education Subcommittee chaired by Representative Sandi Caul from Mt. Pleasant. I believe our presentation was well received. As a part of these two days in Lansing, I visited with Lt. Gov. John Cherry regarding the higher education commission he will lead. There was strong interest expressed by the Lt. Our message regarding Ferris and the successful preparation it provides for careers is being very well received in Lansing. Further I believe strongly this is precisely what Michigan needs now.
