CE-535 OCLC Utilization in Health Sciences Libraries (Curtice Suite)

8 contact hours

A basic introduction to using the OCLC system in the health sciences library. The course will include: understanding the MARC record; evaluating the OCLC subsystems; modifying cataloging operations to use OCLC; and participating in an OCLC network. Speaker:

Managing the Understaffed Library (Nash Suite)

Panelists from an academic medical center, a large teaching hospital, and a small teaching hospital discuss methods of coping with staff reductions and insufficient personnel. Each panelist will discuss problems encountered and strategies for resolving them. A major focus will be the difficult challenge of maintaining and expanding services while operating within the constraints of staff and budget decreases. Opportunity for audience participation. Reference Interview (Chrysler/Nash Suite)

The identification of the library user's need is basic to the establishment of a used and useful collection. To this end we scan, review, select, order, catalog, and position materials in our libraries. But the job of establishing the collection is only part of the task. The librarian must not only serve to build a collection that meets the needs of the community at large, but the librarian must also serve as the guide to the collection through reference service.

The Reference Interview process is the means by which the librarian and user communicate the purpose of this dialog is to clarify the user's request for information, to translate the query into possible sources of information and to ascertain the relevance of the information provided.

This workshop will focus on this process. It will cover basic tenets, hints for effective negotiation, and procedures for recording queries that may be handled by a third party - such as in the recording of referred computer requests. Speaker:

Hand Searching in Clinical Libraries (Chrysler/Nash Suite)

The presentation will include a brief comparison of hand searches to online searches with the advantages/disadvantages of each. This will be followed by a discussion of reference search forms, what should be included and how they should be used.

The major portion of the presentation will concern itself with the mechanics of the clinical hand search. The concept of "controlled vocabulary" will be analyzed using MESH for the model. Also, references to Hospital Literature and Cumulative Index to Nursing Literature will be used. We will then progress to the relationship of MESH to Index Medicus and the specific use of Index Medicus or Abridged Index Medicus.

The session will be concluded by a review of what to do about non-clinical information requests. The discussion will include the concept of one's own library as an access point to all information sources; the maintenance of a ready reference core collection in one's own library; being acquainted with other libraries in one's geographical area, non-medical as well as medical, with the subject specializations in each; and a knowledge of health related agencies in the area.
