Retention Work Group

Bill Potter indicated that:

- Retaining students during the first year is the biggest problem.
- Educational Counselors will be converted to Directors of Student Academic Affairs and report to the individual colleges (prototype is Shelly VandePanne).
- He has not set goals regarding retention rate and graduation rate.
- Appointment of Academic Advising Specialist is coming.
- MyDegree Audit platform has helped.
- Offered DIST 100, 60% of the students get off probation when enrolled in this.
- His office contacted SAP students, students who applied for graduation but did not receive a degree, and students who should have applied for graduation but did not.
- Looking at pre-pharmacy students receiving a degree after three years or by doing a reverse transfer once they received their Pharm.D. degree then going back and getting a bachelors.
- Offering Summer Bridge Program with 20 students registered right now. This will allow students to then enter a particular college, maybe not their program of choice though.
- Math/Science Center is closed.
- Strategies for successes that are working are:
 - TIP Program Judy Watson
 - o 30% freshmen take Math 110
 - SLA sessions 75-80% pass
- Will have an Education Advisory Board.
- Will review data collection and analyze.
- Students will need to have the attitude and ability to do academic work.
- Directed Studies will assist in getting the students' minds right.
- Ferris will have issues with:
 - o Students of color because it will be a socio-economic issue.
 - o Native American numbers are small.
- Dan Burcham indicated that the Admissions Standards may need to be revisited. Financial aid is going to drive everything we do (Student Academic Progress Policy).
- Will be looking at giving students two-year degrees with a scholarship.

Operations Analyst

- Deanna (Krugler) Goldthwait has accepted the Operations Analyst position. She will begin employment on July 2, 2012.
- Dr. Burcham thanked Mark Schuelke for his assistance with the Student Affairs budgets.
