MLK Day Celebrations

Ferris will celebrate the life and achievements of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. with a series of events Monday, Jan. 21 through Wednesday, Jan. 23. The "We Are" themed celebration is sponsored by the Office of Multicultural Student Services, the Jim Crow Museum of Racist Memorabilia, Student Government, Entertainment Unlimited, and the Office of Diversity and Inclusion. Many events have become traditions at Ferris: the in-service program of readings, the annual Freedom March and the MLK Student Tribute. New events this year: a Soup Kitchen, a Student Government-hosted symposium, and "Race Off with Teja Arboleda" at Williams Auditorium. The extraordinary resources of the expanded Jim Crow Museum will be used for special presentations and tours of the museum.

I want to encourage you to help celebrate the legacy of Martin Luther King Jr. on this day by volunteering. Our expanded Jim Crow Museum brings the intolerance Dr. King fought against into painfully sharp focus. However, this resource and others is only valuable to the extent that people learn from the past and make use of it. As Dr. King famously said, "Life's most persistent and urgent question is, 'What are you doing for others?'" Please plan on getting involved in this year's MLK events.

Higher Education Excellence in Diversity Award

Ferris State University recently received a 2012 INSIGHT Into Diversity Higher Education Excellence in Diversity Award from *INSIGHT Into Diversity* magazine. In accepting the award for Ferris, Vice President for Diversity and Inclusion David Pilgrim noted the work our university has done in expanding the Jim Crow Museum, establishing our Center for Latin@ Studies, and attracting international students and students who qualify for the Tuition Incentive Program. Ferris was one of 48 colleges and universities nationwide to receive the honor.

While there will always be work to do in terms of creating an inclusive and tolerant society, it is also important to recognize steps that have been taken to make positive difference in this area. My thanks to David Pilgrim and everyone in the Diversity and Inclusion Office, Matt Chaney and everyone in Multicultural Student Services, and everyone at the university who has made diversity and inclusion a priority.

100th Anniversary of Gov. Ferris' Inauguration

Ferris State University is commemorating the 100th anniversary of its founder, Woodbridge Ferris, being sworn in as governor of Michigan. "Celebrating the Legacy: Gov. Woodbridge N. Ferris" will take place at 7 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 16, at BUS 111. Associate Professor of Music Harry Dempsey will portray Gov. Woodbridge Ferris, and discuss some of the changes in politics and the state that have taken place between then and now with Big Rapids Mayor Mark Warba. Commemorative t-shirts will be handed out and refreshments served in the IRC Connector following the celebration.

It is rare for a public university to be named after its founder, and we are extremely fortunate to have been founded by a great man with a true passion and vision for education. The Ferris community has a rare sense of history regarding its university, which I believe helps to provide a sense of context not just for its history, but for its present and future. The hands-on, experiential educational philosophy Woodbridge Ferris established still guides the education we offer today. This is a great opportunity to pay tribute to our founder.

I want to thank the members of Ferris' History Task Force and Political Engagement Project who organized this event, which is free and open to the public. students. On behalf of the Ferris community, I want to thank Doug for his many years leading the Academic Senate and for his willingness to apply his experience and expertise to yet another leadership position at our university.

In Memoriam

Ferris suffered two very sad and tragic losses over the semester break – Associate Professor of Pharmacy, Dr. Lucy Ngoh, and student, True Whitsey. Professor Ngoh, who joined Ferris in 1992, died in a bus accident while visiting relatives in her native country of Cameroon. True was the victim of a senseless shooting in Detroit while visiting his family over the break.
