# ALL ABOUT RESIDENCIES: A SURVEY OF PAST RESIDENTS FROM THE MICHIGAN COLLEGE OF OPTOMETRY

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#### **ABSTRACT**

Background: There have been a limited number of surveys of past optometric residents and there have been none specific to past residents from the Michigan College of Optometry (MCO). This survey was designed to gather a broad array of data about residents and the residency programs they completed in an effort to educate and inform current and future MCO students who may be interested in completing a post-graduate residency program. Methods: MCO graduates who have completed a residency program were contacted via e-mail and asked to complete an online survey; the link to the survey was available in the e-mail. Results: The surveys were tallied, revealing valuable information about residency programs. Conclusions: The data was compiled so many aspects of residencies can easily be accessed by current and future MCO students or other interested parties.

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#### Introduction:

In an effort to acquire a variety of information about the outcomes of residencies, according to the former residents who completed the programs, an online survey was conducted. The survey questions were quite diverse in order to obtain information about many aspects of the residency experience.

#### Methods:

An online survey was created through www.zoomerang.com, a free online tool for creating, managing and analyzing surveys. A series of questions regarding many aspects of residencies was written by the student intern involved in this project, and those questions were edited by the intern's advisor.

A list of former residents from MCO was compiled through two methods. First, the information about a number of former residents had already been stored at MCO on a computer database. This information was easily accessed. Secondly, the Associate Dean of MCO was able to assist in recalling a number of other past residents who had not been entered into the database. The e-mail addresses of all of these identified past residents was gathered with the help of Ferris State University's Alumni Relations Office.

Altogether, 54 former residents were identified. E-mail addresses were found for 35 of these 54 people. Invitations to complete the online survey were sent via e-mail to these 35 former residents from MCO; unfortunately, only 27 of those e-mails were successfully sent due to some of the acquired e-mail addresses being invalid.

From the 27 successful e-mails sent, 22 completed surveys resulted. The surveys were completed on an anonymous basis, so it cannot be determined which former residents completed the surveys. The answers to the survey were tabulated and analyzed.

#### Survey:

The survey was composed of twenty questions which explored different aspects of the residency experience, along with the demographics of those who completed the survey. The entire survey is as follows (note that the format was slightly different in the online version that the survey-takers completed):

  It was a very difficult and stressful year, but I will always have the skills I acquired and be able to use them to advance my profession and serve patients better. I have greatly expanded the RGP use in the practice I work in and have had

- the chance to change the lives of people who couldn't see before. It is very rewarding. If I hadn't done this residency I would not have been able to help these people.
- o. In some ways I was controlled too much and then expected to have too much responsibility in others. It was uneven in that respect, but I had a wonderful variety of experiences that I would not have gotten anywhere else.
- p. PCO faculty were amazing, very helpful. Camaraderie with 13 other residents made it very fun and fulfilling.
- q. My residency experience was amazing. When I first completed optometry school, I did not feel I had all the skills and knowledge needed to properly manage patients. There were many types of patients I had not been exposed to while doing my fourth year clinical rotations and I felt uncomfortable treating and managing these types of patients. When I did my rotation at the VA, I realized how much knowledge I was still lacking. It was my final rotation and it really made me look into doing a residency. I am forever grateful for doing my residency. Not only was I exposed to a lot of pathology, I also learned to manage patients, perform specific diagnostic tests, order lab tests and make appropriate referrals. Here is what a residency teaches you, on top of becoming comfortable with managing many different types of patients and increasing knowledge in specific areas of the residency program,...it teaches you to think differently. Even if you don't know what you're looking at, you are taught to go through an entire thought process to figure it out on your own, or at least have done all that you can do, and then make the appropriate referral. With the continuing growth of the scope of our practice,

it is our responsibility to manage patients with the highest standard of care....this is what I feel a residency did for me. I feel confident with every decision I make, whether it be a treatment modality vs. a referral vs. ordering specific testing. While a residency is very challenging, it teaches you skills that, not only benefit you in clinic and professionally, but also personally and in your private life. It is definitely worth the sacrifice for a year because the knowledge gained is invaluable. I am forever grateful to my residency program, the time and the dedication of my residency directors, and the overall experience. If you go into a program, staying positive and trying your best, you will get the most out of the experience that is possible.

  - c. In addition to the clinical skills, I have greatly enjoyed the relationships I developed with faculty, other residents, and students. I keep in touch with a number of them.

  - e. Extra networking, rotations with area specialists, opportunities to improve teaching skills, health insurance/travel benefits, ability to work before licensure was complete, and a job offer:)
  - f. It helped me in pursuing AAO Fellowship. It broadened my perspective and understanding in many areas of optometry.

- g. Make connections with other residents and leaders in the profession.
- h. Teaching experience.
- i. confidence with difficult patients, made contacts with other important professionals nationwide
- j. Relationships developed within the profession.
- k. I was able to travel an extensive amount during my residency and have created a large network of contacts throughout the country who one day may lead to a better job.
- In addition to the varied pt experience, there was the further exposure to
  academia. There is a whole different view of it as a student, as a resident, and as
  an instructor.
- m. I feel extremely confident in the way I manage my patients. I know that I have the skills necessary to provide the best patient care possible, especially with our expanding scope of practice. I also have learned to appreciate the academic side of optometry. I find myself more involved with the American Academy of Optometry than I probably would have been had I not done a residency. I learned to appreciate reading case reviews, studies, and journals as well. I am very respected by the ophthalmologists that I work with and have a great working relationship with them. I feel I am very respected and the doctors I work with know that I am managing patients appropriately.

  - a. Good questions! Do a residency!:)
  - b. I would likely only hire another associate if he/she were residency trained
  - c. While I think that residencies are a wonderful opportunity, I do not think they are right for everyone. Not to mention there are not enough possibilities for each student to have a residency. These are the biggest drawbacks to a mandatory residency that I can see.

- d. It was hard work for little pay, but it was well worth the experience.

- g. I think residencies are a wonderful opportunity for many people; however, I do not believe they are for everyone and should not be a mandatory part of optometric education. They are for individuals who want to pursue an academic career, specialized practice such as VA or specialty practice, or individuals who need more security in their skills and more direction that can be achieved in optometry school by itself. The average practitioner in the average primary care practice does not really benefit from a residency.
- h. I feel a residency should be required with our expanding scope of practice. I feel fourth year rotations just aren't enough...you don't get enough exposure to different types of patients, in my opinion.

#### Conclusion:

While former residents obviously held different views regarding different aspects of their residency experience, the overall feedback has proven to be of a positive nature. It is the hope of the author that this survey will be useful to students who are contemplating doing a residency, and to faculty and others who contribute to educating students regarding residency programs.
