Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 10:19 a.m.

Approval of Minutes

Barbara Kormelink requested a change on page 3 of the minutes: under Document Delivery Committee, second sentence should read "Given that SERHOLD is working again in the future, it may not be necessary to produce MISHULS again." Alexia Estabrook moved that the minutes be approved as corrected, Joan Emahiser seconded, and the motion passed.

Archivist's Report

No report at this time.

Treasurer's Report

Ellen O'Donnell distributed a report covering financial activity for the period 10/11/98 through 1/22/99. Our balance stands at \$31,155.34. SilverPlatter has still not paid for the conference lunch they were to sponsor, so this has increased the conference deficit a bit.

Ellen discovered a \$335 discrepancy between the Treasurer's reports and the actual checkbook balance. This discrepancy had been on the books for quite some time. It was probably due to a time lag in processing deposits. Ellen has adjusted the report to eliminate the discrepancy; in future the books should exactly balance to the report.

Ellen discovered that we needed to submit a form to the Internal Revenue Service in November (and we should have filed in 1997 as well) because our annual income has averaged greater than \$25,000. Ellen filed the necessary form along with a note of apology to the IRS. They do not take our money, but they will be watching how we spend it.

Doris Blauet moved to accept the Treasurer's report as submitted, Joan Emahiser seconded, and the motion carried.

Audit Committee

No action since our last meeting.

Bylaws Committee

Mary Hanson is revising the bylaws to incorporate our approved changes; she will send the file to Leslie Behm or Mike Simmons for mounting on the web site.

Collection Development Committee

No report at this time. Betty Marshall's mother passed away recently. The Board instructed the Secretary to send Betty a card expressing our sympathy.

Conference Planning Committee

Doreen Bradley stated that the conference program has been settled. Details are being mounted on our web site as they develop. A link to the conference web site will appear on the Midwest Chapter's web page too.

Education Committee

Valeria Long distributed handouts describing the programming planned for the 1999 conference. The continuing education courses offer something for everyone. One course on "Exploring Technology," presented by the GMR, will be broadcast to four other sites in the Midwest. The "Journal Futures" panel will include someone from Elsevier, which should be very interesting. A contributed papers program is planned; papers will be solicited via the MHSLA newsletter. The Committee has also developed contacts with the Grand Rapids Chamber of Commerce who will be able to help out if any of our speakers should cancel.

There is a support staff workshop planned for the spring, probably late April. Bill Forgette will instruct on using Access Michigan resources for medical information. Michigan Library Consortium is sponsoring this workshop. A nominal registration fee will be charged.

Local Arrangements Committee

Sandy Swanson reported that they are working on menus. Meals are very expensive at the Amway - \$3000 for a lunch, \$700 every time we have a coffee break. We need to expect that this conference will cost more than usual. The conference theme has been changed to "Bridging Traditions," and a design professional has been hired to create a logo. We will hold a welcome reception on Wednesday evening at the Gerald Ford Museum with entertainment from the Improv. Hosted dinners for Tuesday evening are a possibility; there are six restaurants in the Amway alone.

Conference costs are mounting; projected expenses are already between \$35,000 – 40,000. Sandy proposed a fee schedule of \$85 for half-day CE, \$150 for one-day CE, \$100 for one-day conference registration and \$165 for full conference registration. We will charge vendors \$250. We can't afford to offer member discounts this year, but these fees are reasonable and in keeping with similar events. Doris Blauet moved to approve the fee schedule, Joan Emahiser seconded, and the motion passed. We should just about break even with this conference. The Midwest Chapter is contributing \$500 toward the costs. The MHSLA Board had previously approved \$1000 as a grant toward conference costs, but Ellen O'Donnell pointed out that we are paying the costs anyway so it doesn't really make sense to give a grant to ourselves.

Document Delivery Committee

Barbara Kormelink reported that there may still be interest in a printed MISHULS list. There is definitely interest in QuickDoc training since Docline will be switching to web access. The Education Committee may want to keep this in mind as a future workshop topic, possibly get Jay Daly to present.

Leslie Behm is still accepting changes to our SERLINE holdings records.

Membership Committee

Mike Simmons stated that all the membership renewals he has received have been processed – 110 so far, a better initial response than last year. About 51 members have not turned in their forms yet. Lots of changes have been reported in phone numbers and zip codes. Mike also received a 1099 form from Henry Ford Hospital, which he turned over to the Treasurer for action.

Mike asked how he should handle the hospitals such as Port Huron Mercy which have eliminated their librarians and have not paid MHSLA dues. Consensus was that they should be treated just like anyone who is slow to pay. After the second notice, they will get a warning that their DOCLINE accounts will be deactivated unless they renew.

Nominating Committee

Joan Emahiser reported that she is working on a list of names, and will have a slate of candidates ready for approval at our May meeting.

Publications Committee

Leslie Behm reported that she's been working on the next newsletter and is waiting to receive one last article before going to press.

Research Committee

Leslie Behm reported that their survey on "benchmarking" will be mailed out next week.

Technology Committee

Mike Simmons and Sandy Swanson reported that two electronic journal clubs are underway! Sandy is organizing one on the value of information, and Mike is organizing another on hospital librarians' role in intranets and the Internet. CE credits for this activity need to be requested through an MLA chapter; Sandy will check with the Chair of the Midwest Chapter's Education Committee about this, but doesn't expect a problem. The MSU server has been down a couple of times, but overall the journal club is working well. MLA has accepted a proposal from the Technology Committee for a conference poster presentation focusing on their experience setting up the journal club.

Regional Group Reports

ERHSLA - Doris Blauet stated that they have not met.

MDMLG - Alexia Estabrook and Joan Emahiser reported. They are still reviewing the restructuring of the organization. A number of events have been planned for 1999. Fran Buckley, Superintendent of Documents, will speak in February at the Grosse

Pointe War Memorial. Speakers are also planned for meetings in April and September. A half-day CE course on HTML and basic Java script will be presented by Mike Simmons in March. A showing of the evidence-based medicine video was well-attended.

<u>MACHIS</u> - Mary Hanson stated that they have not met, but Marge Kars is working on setting up a journal club. Mary will check with Marge to see if they want to plan an event for the conference.

<u>M-MHSL</u> – John Coffey reported that they met in December at Sparrow, where Leslie Behm presented on basic concepts in evidence-based medicine. They will meet again next week in Okemos and election results will be announced.

NMHSLG - Norma Powers sent word that she is trying to determine dates and a location for the 2000 conference. The Park Place in Traverse City has been refurbished very nicely since we were there. If the group prefers Mackinac Island, Norma does not want to be the organizer. Another possibility is Marquette, there is a facility there capable of handling us. The Board discussed these options and decided on Traverse City and the Park Place. Marquette is so far away that we were concerned about attendance, and Mackinac Island would mean two fairly expensive conferences back-to-back. Leslie will call Norma and tell her we've settled on Traverse City.

<u>UPHSLC</u> – Ken Nelson sent word that they have met to watch video conferences at Michigan Technical University along with other librarian colleagues from the area.

<u>WMHSLA</u> – Sandy Swanson reported that they've been working on the conference. They are meeting again on February 25.

<u>GMR</u> – Stephanie John said there's nothing new to report. She will take part in a conference call next week to discuss education.

As an aside, Stephanie mentioned that her responsibilities in Saginaw have expanded considerably. She is involved in web hosting, intranet work, e-mail, video conferencing, and year 2000 compliance for the institution.

Old Business

Merging of Access Michigan and MEL
The merger is on hold for the time being.

New Business

Designating MACHIS as a Standing Committee

This question had been raised at the annual conference. The Board deliberated and determined that there would be no advantage to changing MACHIS's status; in fact,

they would lose their vote on the Board. MACHIS will continue to be treated as a regional group.

Retroactive Service Recognition for Past Presidents

For the past ten years or so we have given a plaque to each Board President when he or she steps down. Diane Hummel asked if we should offer plaques to past presidents who served before this practice was instituted. This would be fewer than ten individuals. The Board agreed this would be a nice idea. Diane will draft a letter to the past presidents asking if they would like plaques, and will forward it to the Secretary for distribution to the appropriate individuals.

Elimination of Librarian Positions in Michigan Medical Institutions

Board members expressed concern about the debacle at Port Huron Mercy (the elimination of Bonnie Swegles' position). We debated what our response as an organization should be. A "best practice" statement could be prepared, e.g. "here's how an ILL should be done, and if you don't do it this way, we won't look at it." But this would be unlikely to influence hospital administrators, who are making the decisions to cut librarians. Marketing, tied to research data, is more likely to be effective. We need to continue gathering data on how libraries are cost-effective and improve quality of care – and we need to get these facts to the decision-makers.

Brainstorming ensued, with ideas including a presentation at the annual Michigan Health & Hospital Association Council on Affiliate Organizations; an article – or a regular column - in *Michigan Health & Hospitals*; a "survival kit" with a bibliography and articles on the value of information professionals; an attractive calendar aimed at CEOs. Barbara Kormelink moved that we investigate preparing an information kit and placing an article in *MH&H*. Doris Blauet seconded, and the motion carried. Diane Hummel and Leslie Behm will work on it.

Adjournment

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 1:00 p.m.

Exploring Technology:

Collaborations Between Libraries and Information Systems

This half-day program will explore significant issues that play a role in collaborative projects between library and information system personnel. The program will begin with an introduction of cultural, systems thinking, and technical issues that can effect working relationships. The second part of the program will highlight the collaborative relationships between library and informations systems personnel in three different organizations that range in size from small to large. Some material will be presented by individual speakers, but the focus of the conference is on interaction among the three library/information systems teams and conference attendees at the Grand Rapids sites as well as those at distance sites connected by videoconferencing technology. A packet of support materials will be included. Conference attendees are encouraged to invite information systems personnel from their organizations to attend this program in order to facilitate productive discussion.

The RML has agreed to cover the cost of running the video conference. There is also the complex situation of offering the CE at the remote sites. The RML plans to take care of the registration for this particular CE class s and provide the Midwest Chapter with a percentage to cover any costs they will incur in running

CE classes. They would charge the same as the Midwest Chapter for the class, which will be around \$50 for a half day CE. This would be easier for both RML and MHSLA to budget and cover the costs of running the CE since the RML has agreed to pay for part of it.

About the speakers

Doug Van Houweling (Thursday morning, October 7)

Douglas Van Houweling is president and chief executive officer of the University Corporation for Advanced Internet Development (UCAID). Dr. Van Houweling was named to the position on October 1, 1997. UCAID's membership consists of more than 100 U.S. research universities, which, in collaboration with private and public sector partners, is engaged in the Internet2 project to advance networking technology and applications for the research and education community. Dr. Van Houweling is taking a leave from his professorship in the School of Information at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. He also served as the University's vice provost for Information and Technology and was responsible for the University's strategic direction in the information technology arena. In addition, as dean for Academic Outreach, he was responsible for providing access to the University's learning environment, research activities, and service programs unconstrained by space and time. Dr. Van Houweling has played a major role in the developing Internet environment in the United States. He was vice chair of the Steering Committee of the Internet2 project with responsibility for partner relations. He is chairman of the board of MERIT, Inc., a Michigan statewide computing network. MERIT, in partnership with IBM, MCI, and the Michigan Strategic Fund, was awarded responsibility for operation and management of the NSFNet national backbone network. Dr. Van Houweling is also chairman of the Board of Advanced Network and Services Corporation, a nonprofit organization which implemented and operated the world's largest Internet backbone network from 1991 until 1995. Advanced Network and Services has transferred its operational capability to America Online through a \$40 million sale, and is using the proceeds to support networking for education and research. He has also been active in interuniversity initiatives, serving on the EDUCOM Board and playing roles in establishing numerous initiatives to establish cooperative information technology efforts among universities. He was a founder of EDUCOM's Networking and Telecommunication Task Force and the Interuniversity Consortium for Educational Computing. Dr. Van Houweling is chairman of the board of the Environmental Research Institute of Michigan, a research and development enterprise serving government and industry in the information access and processing arena. Dr. Van Houweling received his undergraduate degree from Iowa State University and his doctorate in government from Indiana University.

Richard Wiggins and Charles Severance (Thursday morning, October 7)

Wiggins and Severance host the TV show Nothin' but the Net.

Richard Wiggins is author of *The Internet for Everyone: A Guide for Users and Providers* and manages the Central Systems Services group in the Computer Laboratory at Michigan State University. He coordinates the deployment of MSU's campus-wide information system (CWIS) using Gopher and World-Wide Web. He has been active in the Gopher and WWW communities since early 1992, and organized the first Gopher Workshop in August 1992. He began working with computer networks in 1979 as a consultant helping users of the Merit network. Previously he has contributed to a book on the VM/C MS operating system and to Computer Language magazine and the Internet Letter. He moderates the Usenet News group comp.infosystems.announce. He presented at the Special Libraries Association annual conference in June, 1998.

Charles Severance is Director of the Division of Engineering Computer Services (DECS) in the MSU College of Engineering and author of *High Performance Computing* from O'Reilly and Associates. He is an Assistant Professor in the MSU Department of Computer Science and Engineering. His research is the area of high performance parallel computing.

Michele Bowman (speaking Friday morning, October 8 and conducting a Saturday all day CE) As a Principal of Global Foresight Associates, Ms. Bowman's work focuses on helping organizations to develop strategies for the long-term future by exploring the dynamics of social, economic and technological changes affecting business, government and society. Her methods and expertise assist organizations in creating a structure and culture of futures thinking that brings creativity to the fore and helps clarify key issues for decision-makers. Ms. Bowman has successfully used these processes in private and public sector engagements in such diverse industries as health care, education and the government. Ms. Bowman has been involved in a wide range of consulting and research projects, including developing scenarios for the American Cancer Society and a Fortune 500 health care company. As an Associate at the Institute far Alternative Futures she managed a series of Foresight Seminars which brought Congressional members and staff together with industry leaders to explore trends and emerging issues in health care policy. She co-created and developed Preferred Futures Design, a futures studies curriculum and guidebook that uses scenarios and visioning exercises to help participants plan for the future. In addition to her futures work, Ms. Bowman has served as a legislative analyst to two State Representatives. In that capacity, she was responsible for drafting and tracking legislation as well as producing policy and issues briefs for members. As a Project Analyst for the Pacific Business Center, she provided a variety of management consulting services to existing and venture businesses. Ms. Bowman holds a Masters Degree from the University of Hawai'i -Manoa, one of only two schools in the United States to offer an advanced degree in Futures Studies. Her professional affiliations include the World Future Society and the World Futures Studies Federation.

Paul Groll (speaking at a concurrent session Thursday afternoon and conducting a Wednesday morning CE) Paul Groll is Director of Network and Information Systems Division at the Library of Michigan. Following an education in the Honors College at Michigan State University, he went on to take a graduate degree from the Hawai'i Institute of Marine Biology (UH). He then fully expected to spend the rest of his life around, in, (and under) the Pacific Ocean, pursuing his first loves—the study of complex coral reef ecosystems, and teaching. Opportunity beckoned from the east, though, and freshwater ecosystem research using deep-diving submersibles and robots brought him to Michigan State University to pursue a Ph.D. After plumbing the depths of Superior, Michigan, and Huron for several years, the research efforts indicated an advance in the understanding of theory.

The elegant mathematical landscapes of design and modeling drew out Paul's next passion—theoretical ecology. The design, manipulation, simulation, and testing of complex ecosystem models are tasks poorly suited to our innate number-crunching faculties—but perfectly suited to computers. Before long, Paul was spending most of his waking hours designing and writing all the software to support the MSU research team in this area. Within two years, he found himself making a living more from computer and software consulting than from ecology. In 1989, Paul left graduate school to take on a split appointment as System Administrator for the Institute for Environmental Toxicology and the Great Lakes/Mid-Atlantic Hazardous Substance Research Center of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, both at Michigan State University. He remained there for five years.

In 1990, he founded a private consulting firm dealing mostly with networking and software development, an effort he still maintains in his copious free time. Paul joined the staff of the Library of Michigan in 1995 as an Information Systems Specialist. In 1996, he became the Division Director for Network & Information Systems (NIS.) Recent accomplishments include taking certifications from Checkpoint Software as a Network Security Engineer (one of two in State Government, both at LM), and from Bay Networks as a Network Systems Engineer.

During Paul's tenure at LM, NIS has completed the installation of a fibre-optic network backbone throughout the Library, including a 1/3 mile span to the Law Library; the conversion of the entire network to Category 5 cabling and fully managed RMON hubs; the installation of three Sun internet servers, for the LM website, database server, and firewall; the addition of over 100 Pentium systems to the staff and patron work areas; the incorporation of several Windows NT servers into the LM network; the implementation of a networked training center with seven PowerMacs and seven Windows systems; a revitalization of the CDROM network system, including Paul's design and programming of a custom application for managing over 250 CDROM titles online; and the design, programming, and management of a server-based, searchable, interactive database system for publishing current Legislative information on the web.

MHSLA Electronic Journal Club

As many of you may be aware, the MHSLA Technology Committee has been working toward putting an electronic journal club in place, so that our members can:

Participate in interesting and stimulating discussions of issues important to their continuing success in the profession.

Interact with colleagues who are geographically remote, but as close as a click on a Web page.

Earn CE credit (7.5 points in a 6-month period) for free!

Here are the details:

Electronic Journal Clubs, according to MLA guidelines, have between 3 and 10 members, with one member designated as the 'convener'. The convener solicits members, assumes responsibility for designating a theme, and distributes and collects the forms necessary for members to receive academy points. The convener may also supply some participants with copies of the articles being discussed. For Academy credits members must read 6-12 articles on a particular theme, (1-2 articles per month) and 'meet' using some form of electronic communication (a listsery, regular email, synchronous 'chat' software, or asynchronous conferencing software) for six months. Each member must post two or more substantial comments during at least five but preferably all six of the discussions to receive credit for participation. Copies of discussions must be attached to other forms submitted for Academy points. Members earn 7.5 points for completion of one six-month journal club session; conveners earn an additional 4.5.

MHSLA has put conferencing software, called Web Crossing, in place for electronic journal club discussion. It is available through the 'members only' section of the MHSLA web page (username: mhsla, password: hippo). There is an interactive tutorial at this site for those interested in participating. Those considering involvement are encouraged to take a look. The software requires users to register, although 'guests' may also take the tutorial.

We are now looking for MHSLA members interested in electronic journal club participation for the six-month period from the beginning of January to the end of June. Please e-mail or call Laura Friesen-Lynn (chair, Technology Committee, Lfriese1@hurleymc.com or 810-257-9401) to indicate your interest in participating as a journal club member or convener. More than one journal club can exist at one time; the number of different clubs and themes being discussed depends on the number of MHSLA members who are interested.

Journal club topics will be decided by the conveners in conjunction with the members of their clubs. Articles to be read and discussed do not all have to be decided upon at the outset; they can be discovered anytime during the six-month time frame, as long as enough time is allotted for club members to read and discuss them.

Call to Order

MDMLG -Alexia reported that their February meeting featuring Fran Buckley went well. On April 15 their speaker will be Nettie Seabrooks, Chief Operating Officer of the City of Detroit (and a librarian by training). They will have Dorothy Hill coming in September.

Also, Barb Burson and Myrna Proctor are retiring from St. John and two parttime positions will be posted. MACHIS - No report at this time.

M-MHSL - John Coffey reported that Harvey Brenneise hosted their last meeting. They toured his new facility and watched a twenty-minute video promoting the Michigan Electronic Library. The video was narrated by two television news anchors from Lansing and was very well done.

Harvey will be presenting at their next meeting. He runs the electronic library for the Michigan Public Health Institute, providing online resources for public health workers in the state.

<u>NMHSLG</u> –Norma Powers informed us that Munson continues to expand. Her library provides services to three other hospitals they own or are affiliated with. No extra money has been allotted to the library for serving additional clients. However, they do receive funds from Munson's medical staff. Norma just visited the hospital in Manistee and is developing a proposal to provide services for them as well. It is important to Munson to keep the clinics and smaller hospitals in their area alive.

A planned Community Health Information Center will be under Norma's direction. Thirteen hundred feet of a new 3000-foot space has been allotted for this project, which will provide free library services to the community. They meet with the architect next week; Norma and her staff will be visiting the new hospital libraries in Grand Rapids to get design ideas. Norma has been wanting to do this for years, and once her CEO signed on to the idea, things started moving very quickly.

A deposit has been made with the Park Place in Traverse City to reserve the space for the 2000 conference. Room rate will be \$85 single/\$95 double.

<u>UPHSLC</u> - Ken Nelson announced he has a new staff member, Kathleen Heitman. This position, formerly held by Denise Macmillan, has been vacant for four months. Marquette General Hospital is expanding and the library may move. Ken is thinking of adding EMBASE to the library's Ovid offerings.

Ken met with Janice Lester and Nancy Manninen on March 11 after the videoconference "Dancing with Change." They are still working on a needs assessment questionnaire for health professionals.

Michigan Technical University will be hosting some MLC workshops next month, on copyright and authority control.

WMHSLA - The first postcard announcing the conference is about to be mailed.

<u>GMR</u> - No report at this time.

New Business

Rosemary Whelan has transferred to the Law Library at the University of Michigan and has resigned her position as our Archivist. Diane Hummel will try to recruit a new Archivist. The Board discussed contracting for storage of the Association's records.

While this would cost us money, it would ensure the security of our archives. Currently, the records are stored by the Archivist wherever he or she can find a place for them. They move each time a new Archivist takes office. It would make sense to contract for storage in a central location such as the Library of Michigan. We might be able to contract for indexing service as well. Diane will ask the new Archivist to research these possibilities.

The question was raised of whether we should sponsor a MHSLA member to attend the annual meeting of MLA. This is something we have never done, and it would be quite costly. Room and board at an annual meeting can really add up. Some thoughts the Board had included:

supporting a first-time attendance at MLA;

increasing our support for members to attend the MHSLA conference; supporting MHSLA members who are presenting posters or papers at MLA. This question was delegated to the Education Committee. Regional groups are welcome to submit their thoughts; we may also float the ideas on the listsery. After our fall conference, the Education Committee will consider this question and will develop recommendations for the Board.

The Board discussed Harvey Brenneise's working paper on the Michigan Community Health Electronic Library (available online at http://www.mphi.org/MITC.html). Leslie Behm met with him yesterday and suggested some names of MHSLA members he could include in the focus group he is planning. Harvey hopes to get this group together in late April. Financing for this project will be challenging.

We may have an opportunity to do some outreach at the Michigan Health & Hospitals Association conference on Mackinac Island in June. Leslie Behm will investigate.

A plaque was presented to Ken Nelson in appreciation of his service as our President last year.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 12:08 p.m.

Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 10:20 a.m.

Approval of Minutes

A change was made to page 3 of the minutes of our March 30 meeting, last sentence in the Conference Planning section. The incoming MLA President's name is spelled *Weise*. Leslie Behm moved that the minutes be approved as corrected, Doris Blauet seconded, and the motion passed.

Archivist's Report

Diane Hummel has not yet appointed an archivist. She has received some suggestions of people who might be interested.

Treasurer's Report

Ellen O'Donnell distributed a report covering financial activity for the period 3/19/99 through 5/18/99. Our balance stands at \$35,165.32. Ellen was successful in persuading the Internal Revenue Service to waive a penalty fee we were assessed for improper filing for the 1996-1997 fiscal year. Her diligence saved the organization over \$1400.

Audit Committee

Lea Ann McGaugh reported that her Committee has reviewed the books. They found the books in excellent order from check 1432 through check 1480 dated February 26, 1999. Air fare is still a large expense. The Board reiterated the recommendations made after the 1997 conference to try to keep travel costs down. We will communicate to speakers that we will only reimburse the value of coach air travel, advance ticket cost (at least two weeks), for the most direct route. Valeria Long will add these guidelines to the Education Committee notebook.

The question was raised of whether we can place our money in an interest-bearing account. This needs to be investigated; we will wait until we've paid for the 1999 conference and the SERHOLD inputting by MSU.

Bylaws Committee

Leslie Behm is awaiting the bylaws which Mary Hanson has revised to reflect changes approved at the 1998 Annual Meeting. When received, they will be mounted on the web site.

Collection Development Committee

Betty Marshall has been answering questions from member libraries regarding discard decisions. Her database contains over 2700 titles held by five or fewer libraries.

Conference Planning Committee/Local Arrangements Committee

Doreen Bradley reported that the conference programs and registration forms will be mailed out in early June. Registration forms will also be available on our web site. We have a new contact at the Amway Grand who has been working with Sandy. The hotel will extend the conference rate to include Monday, October 4.

Frieda Weise of MLA will not be attending after all, but J. Michael Homan, MLA President-Elect, is planning to come. The deadline for posters and papers is May 30.

An optional tour has been added for Saturday, October 9. It will be a guided bus trip around Grand Rapids, including tours of Amberg Library and St. Mary's Library and a lunch. Our special event on Thursday evening is a reception at the Gerald Ford Museum. This will include light refreshments and entertainment. An excellent exhibit on the 20th Century will be up at the Museum and available for our perusal.

Education Committee

Valeria Long reported that a workshop was held for support staff at MLC in Lansing on April 20. Bill Forgette of MLC offered instruction in searching the Access Michigan databases FirstSearch and SearchBank. Feedback from the twelve attendees was positive (although the lunch they were served left much to be desired).

Program planning for the conference is going smoothly. Valeria recently met with a team from the GMR Regional Medical Library to discuss the videoconference session on *Exploring Technology*. This half-day CE course will be broadcast from the Cook Institute in Grand Rapids to four other sites in the Midwest. The GMR will provide publicity for this videoconference. MHSLA will coordinate registration for all the sites.

Document Delivery Committee

Leslie Behm reported that Barbara Kormelink has written to four institutions registered on DOCLINE who have not paid MHSLA dues, warning that their DOCLINE access would be revoked. All were in the Detroit area and none has responded.

Membership Committee

Mike Simmons said membership renewals keep trickling in. We are currently at 131 members, down quite a bit from last year. The membership database on the web seems to be working and Mike encouraged us to try it.

Mike voiced his willingness to continue as membership Chair. He feels we can take advantage of the electronic database to get memberships processed faster. Inputting from handwritten membership forms is problematic and errors can occur. Mike suggests we redesign the paper form, and make more use of the electronic form (e.g. have members verify their information online and get back to us with corrections). We could use the Midwest Chapter MLA form as a model; it shows text in one column and space for corrections in another.

Mike and Leslie will be working on the 1999 directory this weekend.

Nominating Committee

Joan Emahiser presented the slate of candidates. Doris Blauet is running unopposed for President and Diana Balint is running unopposed for Secretary. The Board and the Nominating Committee still need a representative from the Upper Peninsula. Ken Nelson's administration nixed his participation this year. There are not many other members in the UP from whom to choose.

Betty Marshall moved that the slate be approved as presented, Doris Blauet seconded, and the motion passed.

Publications Committee

Leslie Behm is revising the MHSLA brochure. MLA's "Making a Difference" communications tool has been useful. The Midwest Chapter MLA wonders how many MHSLA chapters have

web pages; currently it's just M-MHSL and MDMLG. A MACHIS web page would be a great idea; many renewing MHSLA members expressed interest in MACHIS on their registration forms. Perhaps Marge Kars could be persuaded to develop the web page.

The Board discussed mounting our list of officers in the public section of our web site and decided to do this.

Research Committee

Lea Ann McGaugh stated that the second mailing of the "benchmarking" survey was mailed and four responses have been received (as well as one refusal). Lea Ann and Leslie acknowledged that the questionnaire takes a lot of work. Respondents should just fill out what they can; the Research Committee can revise and streamline the instrument for next year according to what data people actually collect. This project was undertaken because member libraries said they would find it useful, so their lack of cooperation has been disappointing.

Technology Committee

Laura Friesen-Lynn reported on the poster presentation delivered at MLA in Chicago. The Committee presented their experience in establishing the electronic journal club. It went well. There were a few probing questions, which members handled deftly.

We do have a situation with the Web Crossing software that needs to be addressed. We have exceeded our file usage allotment. Mike Simmons contacted them and was told we need to upgrade our license to the next level at a one-time cost of \$695.

There are currently three discussion rooms in the journal club; Marge Kars wants to start another but is having trouble accessing the software. We need to encourage participation in the discussions. One idea would be for conveners to take a more active role. Another suggestion was to try a synchronous chat room; the time constraint might make people schedule their participation. A problem with this is that MLA requires printed proof of participation in the discussion to award continuing education credits. Our software doesn't archive chat rooms, so we would need to devise another way to save the discussions. We might make the conveners responsible for archiving.

There may be other uses for the Web Crossing software that we can explore; beyond discussion rooms and chat rooms, it might be useful for committee meetings. Jennifer Barlow moved to pay the \$695 to upgrade our Web Crossing license, Doris Blauet seconded, and the motion passed.

Regional Group Reports

ERHSLA – Doris Blauet said they have not had a formal meeting since our last Board meeting. She mentioned that Pat Moreland retired from McLaren and Lea Ann McGaugh is now Director there. Lea Ann's old job at St. Joseph Mercy will be posted after it has been redesigned somewhat.

MDMLG – Alexia Estabrook reported that the Nettie Seabrook meeting was very successful. MDMLG election results are in, Barb Platz is the new President. Their next meeting, sponsored by Elsevier, will take place at the Bayview Yacht Club. The September meeting at Providence will feature Dorothy Hill.

Alexia noted that she is no longer working at Providence, but works one day a week at Aurora and part-time at St. John's.

MACHIS – As previously noted, Marge Kars is hoping to start a discussion group for MACHIS but has been having technical difficulties.

M-MHSL – A small group met at the Michigan Department of Community Health to plan ideas for next year's meetings and programs. They want to offer a copyright class and also hope to bring in an MLA course (perhaps Bet Ison's strategic planning class).

NMHSLG - No report at this time.

<u>UPHSLC</u> – No report at this time.

WMHSLA - Betty Marshall stated that they will be meeting this Thursday.

<u>GMR</u> – No report at this time.

Old Business

SERHOLD

Leslie Behm announced that all SERHOLD updating has been done except for a batch that arrived last week. She will prepare an invoice for MHSLA in June when all the inputting has been completed. Leslie would prefer libraries to send their changes in batches, e.g. monthly, rather than trickling in one by one.

DOCLINE

Leslie attended the DOCLINE sunrise meeting at MLA. DOCLINE forms are up on the Web and look good. NLM expects libraries will be able to do their own updating as of this September. In the new system, users will be able to toggle between OCLC and DOCLINE!

FTS access to DOCLINE is supposedly going away as of June 30, but the Web version will not be accessible until September. It is unclear how we will access DOCLINE in the interim. Contact the GMR with questions or problems.

New Business

Quorums

Leslie Behm observed that we often have problems getting a quorum for Board meetings. It would be wise to examine how the Board is structured and how quorums are set. We may want to recommend some changes. One possibility would be giving voting members permission to assign an alternate, in the event they can't make a scheduled meeting. The alternate would count as part of the quorum and would have temporary ability to vote.

Another issue concerns the present lack of a Board member from the Upper Peninsula. Requiring representatives from both NMHSLG and UPHSLC means those regions are over-represented on the Board, in relation to their population and number of libraries. In the past these groups have resisted merging. However, their logistical difficulties in getting to meetings make it hard for us to get a quorum. It is time to reconsider the configuration of our Board.

Leslie volunteered to draft some bylaws revisions. After Board approval, they would need to get to the membership 30 days before the annual conference.

Focus Group re: MITC Report

Harvey Brenneise, Director of the Michigan Community Health Electronic Library, called a focus group together in April to begin work on the Michigan Information Technology Commission's recommendations for statewide access to health information. Diane Hummel and Leslie Behm were present at the meeting. About half the invited stakeholders were in attendance. The meeting was led by a facilitator and was quite productive. Diane and Leslie made some valuable contributions to the discussion, including pointing out that nurses and osteopathic physicians should have representation on the project.

Harvey's concept paper describing this project can be found at http://www.mphi.org/MITC.html. The initiative is ambitious and inclusive in scope and has great potential for improving access to health information for consumers, educators and health care workers. Cyber-state.org is one of the players and they could be a major source of funding – cyber.state is led by an impressive Board, all from influential organizations with deep pockets.

A change was made to page 4 of the minutes of our May 25 meeting, first sentence in the Research Committee section. The sentence should end: "(as well as one refusal)." The Board recommended approval of the minutes at our next meeting, when an official vote can be taken.

Archivist's Report

Maureen Watson from the Optometry Library at Ferris State University has just been appointed our new Archivist.

Treasurer's Report

Ellen O'Donnell sent a report covering financial activity for the period 5/19/99 through 7/16/99. Our balance stands at \$37,499.17. The Board recommended approval of the report at our next meeting.

Audit Committee

Lea Ann McGaugh stated the Committee has been inactive since our last meeting.

Bylaws Committee

Mary Hanson reported that she has turned the revised bylaws over to Leslie Behm in electronic format for mounting on our web site. Leslie and Mary said they would work on a draft bylaws revision that would allow a regional representative to designate an alternate in the event s/he cannot make a meeting. This would help the Board attain quorums. The Committee will submit the draft to Board members for review via e-mail and will send the proposed revision out to the membership with the next newsletter mailing.

Collection Development Committee

Betty Marshall gave Bay Medical a copy of their unique holdings. She said she would give a copy of her database on disk to Leslie to add to our web site. Betty is willing to run a print copy of unique holdings for any library on request.

Conference Planning Committee/Local Arrangements Committee

Doreen Bradley sent a report on conference arrangements. Planning is moving along quite well. Registration packets have been mailed and the preliminary programs look great. Doreen will send a message to the GMR and MHSLA discussion lists announcing the change of speakers for Paul Groll's continuing education sessions. The registration form is up on the web site. A few library vendors have contacted Doreen about exhibiting and she has referred them to Robin Alanen Mosher.

Jennifer Barlow said she has already received two registration forms, one from Ohio. Jennifer is collecting MHSLA Committee reports for the annual business meeting. Committee chairs should send their reports to Jennifer by August 27 so they can be copied and placed in the registration packets.

Education Committee

Valeria Long sent a report stating they have found replacement speakers for Paul Groll, who had to cancel his presentations. Five poster abstracts and ten paper abstracts have been accepted. Conference scholarships have been awarded to Suzanne Gray (University of Michigan), Sheilia Bryant (Wayne State University), and Deborah Sobczak (Providence Hospital). Diane Hummel will send each of them an official letter along with the registration packet.

Document Delivery Committee

Leslie Behm announced that Barbara Kormelink is retiring at the end of August. A consultant position will be posted to replace her.

Membership Committee

Nominating Committee

Joan Emahiser has prepared the ballot and given it to the Secretary to be copied and mailed next month.

Publications Committee

Leslie Behm said the newsletter is about to be mailed. Bylaws revision and the list of unique journal titles will be mounted on our web site.

Research Committee

Lea Ann McGaugh reported that the Committee has been having a discussion via e-mail on whether they should contact the members who have not responded to their survey. Fewer than half the surveys were returned so the data may not be very valuable. The scope of this project seemed to change as it went along, and that has made things difficult. We will not plan on repeating the survey, but the Board recommended that the Research Committee input the data they do have and produce a report on the results.

Technology Committee

No report at this time.

Regional Group Reports

ERHSLA – Lea Ann McGaugh said they just held a retirement dinner for Barbara Kormelink.

MDMLG – Alexia Estabrook reported that they are having a slow summer. Elsevier sponsored their annual summer luncheon at the Bayview Yacht Club. They are in a transitional period between Boards. They have completed a restructuring, revised their bylaws and merged some committees. They're looking for a Chair for the Newsletter Committee.

Alexia passed along a suggestion from Lynda Baker that MHSLA send out letters offering the student conference scholarships in May or September, when more students are around.

<u>MACHIS</u> – Mary Hanson announced that Marge Kars has set up an electronic journal club for consumer health using the Web Crossing software.

M-MHSL – Leslie Behm said they recently met to brainstorm. They have planned a summer picnic. In September they are having Mike Seadle speak; he is the MSU digital sources librarian and copyright guru. This winter they will be bringing Bet Ison up to do her strategic planning workshop. They had a retirement party for Doris Asher from Sparrow. Jane Claytor attended the party; she is still working for the residency program at St. Lawrence.

<u>NMHSLG</u> – No report from Norma Powers. Rumor has it that the open position at Northern Michigan Hospital has been filled.

<u>UPHSLC</u> - We currently have no Board representative from the Upper Peninsula.

WMHSLA – Sandy Swanson reported that they continue to work on conference arrangements. They want to offer PubMed and FirstSearch training sessions, once the upcoming changes to those systems have been implemented. Mary Hanson has lost a .25 FTE position, and now her .75 FTE person has resigned. The .75 position will be rewritten and posted. Mary will be closing the library for a week in mid-August while she is on vacation. Rose Ray is retiring from Spectrum Health-East this week, and Sandy Swanson's last day is August 20. Sandy will be staying on with WMHSLA to help with the conference. Melba Moss will serve as our new Access Michigan representative.

<u>GMR</u> – Leslie Behm announced that Angela Taylor has left the GMR. Charniel McDaniel is currently our representative. Leslie also deals with Chris Shaffer. Leslie's office is current with inputting changes to SERHOLD. The changes affect DOCLINE instantly, but the online SERHOLD listing is only updated once a year. The online list was updated in May 1998 and Leslie thinks they just did another update.

DOCLINE in its current incarnation is expected to cease in September 1999. It will certainly not last beyond the end of the year as it is not Y2K compliant. The FTS phone line will not work after September; libraries still using it will need to switch to telnet. The new web DOCLINE will only work with the newest browsers. Libraries that don't have the latest browser version should contact Chris Shaffer at the GMR as soon as possible. Jay Daly plans to have a new version of QuickDoc ready to work with the new DOCLINE.

Old Business

MISHULS

Ken Nelson contacted Diane Hummel with a request that the print version of MISHULS not be discontinued. Leslie Behm clarified that MISHULS has been put on hiatus but has not been permanently discontinued. We will reassess next year to see if there is still a demand for it. Once SERHOLD changes have shaken out, there may be a way to obtain data for MISHULS without having to pay for an OCLC tape.

New Business

Access Michigan

Sandy Swanson reminded everyone that the URL for Access Michigan's InfoTrac databases is changing on August 10. Also, workshops in using FirstSearch are being offered in some parts of the state.

Next Meeting

The next Board meeting was set for Tuesday, September 28 at 10:00 a.m. at the Michigan Athletic Club in East Lansing. The Board will review and approve Doreen Bradley's committee appointments.

Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 10:08 a.m.

Approval of Minutes

Minutes from the previous two meetings needed to be approved. Sandy Swanson moved that the minutes of our May meeting be approved as distributed. Joan Emahiser seconded, and the motion carried. Alexia Estabrook moved that the minutes of our July meeting be approved as distributed. Doris Blauet seconded, and the motion carried.

Archivist's Report

Doreen Bradley shipped the MHSLA archives (in twenty-two boxes!) to the new Archivist, Maureen Watson.

Treasurer's Report

Ellen O'Donnell distributed her annual report. Our bank balance as of August 25, 1999 was \$37,674.70. Alexia Estabrook moved to approve the report as submitted, Valeria Long seconded, and the motion carried.

Audit Committee

No report at this time.

Bylaws Committee

Leslie Behm drafted and distributed the proposed bylaws revision. This amendment would allow Board members to designate an alternate for a specific Board meeting in writing, in advance of the meeting. The intent is to improve attendance at Board meetings so we don't have problems establishing a quorum. The membership will vote on this proposal at the business meeting next month.

Collection Development Committee

Betty Marshall has revised the unique holdings database again. She printed lists of unique titles for Mercy General (Oak campus) and St. Joseph's in Mt. Clements. Betty sent the database to Leslie Behm for mounting on the MHSLA web site.

Conference Planning Committee

Doreen Bradley reported that we are at 134 registrants for the conference, which is a good enrollment. Twenty-four vendors have registered as well, and the block of hotel rooms we reserved has been oversold.

Mike Simmons asked for a copy of the vendor list to put up on the conference web site.

Education Committee

Valeria Long reported a switch in speakers for Friday lunch at the conference. We now have a speaker on nutraceuticals lined up. Also, the session on "Deciphering the L's" will now be presented by James Droscha from the Library of Michigan. Valeria will be doing a trial run of the videoconferencing equipment tomorrow with staff at the remote sites. This teleconference continuing education course is a first for us and Valeria hopes it goes well.

Regarding other Education Committee projects, they are discussion co-hosting NLM's Molecular Biology class, perhaps in Ann Arbor. There are two versions of this class available, one geared for scientists and the other for librarians.

Local Arrangements Committee

Sandy Swanson said that at this point the Committee is dealing with details. An EOS Users' Group breakfast meeting has been added for Friday. Attendees will reimburse MHSLA. Let Anne Shaner in Saginaw know if you want to come.

A sample conference bag was passed around for the Board to see. The Greater Midwest Region made a contribution toward the cost of the bags, and their logo appears on one side.

Document Delivery Committee

Barbara Kormelink has retired. A new Chair for the Document Delivery Committee is being sought.

Membership Committee

Mike Simmons said he is still trying to make the electronic membership database work properly on the web site. He's updating the file with the latest data and he is looking at revising the membership form.

Valeria Long inquired if MHSLA has a presence at the Michigan Library Association annual meeting. Public librarians who deal with health questions might be interested in joining, or at least participating in our conference. Mike said the current president of MLA works at Michigan State University, it would be easy to contact her to explore opportunities for collaboration. MHSLA could offer programming geared for public librarians at our conference, or we could make a presentation at their conference.

Nominating Committee

Joan Emahiser reported on the election results. One hundred three ballots were returned and counted by the committee, consisting of Joan, Nancy Bulgarelli and Jean Gilbert. Our new President-Elect is Doris Blauet. Diana Balint is the new Secretary. Nominating Committee will consist of Norma Powers, Alexia Estabrook, and Melba Moss (Chair).

Publications Committee

Leslie Behm sent out the final newsletter of the year last month. It included the membership directory. The committee is still working on a marketing project, to be pursued next year.

Research Committee

Leslie Behm reported that half of the survey data has been entered onto the computer. She hopes to tabulate the data and have a preliminary report ready for the next Board meeting.

Technology Committee

Mike Simmons reported that there are currently four electronic discussion groups underway. They are going along nicely. Mike has not followed up on getting the increased licensure for Web Crossing, but will do so after the annual conference.

Regional Group Reports

ERHSLA - Doris Blauet said they have not met since Barbara Kormelink's going-away party.

MDMLG – Alexia Estabrook reported that their first business meeting of the year took place last week. They had Dorothy Hill speak – her first public speaking engagement since Alfred Brandon passed away. Ms. Hill made some powerful analogies regarding books vs. bytes. She doesn't like the Internet because it is not peer-reviewed or quality-filtered.

MDMLG is no longer producing a print newsletter, but instead will mount an electronic version on its newly revamped web site. Alexia continues to tweak the web site and would welcome any feedback. The new URL is http://www.mdmlg.org; it offers links to DOCLINE, TYMNET and QuickDOC. MDMLG will also be relocating their listsery.

Their November speaker will be Judy Field, giving a talk on "Marketing the Library."

MACHIS - Mary Hanson reported that Marge Kars got an electronic journal club going.

M-MHSL – John Coffey reported that their last meeting took place on September 16. Michael Seale talked about copyright issues. Doris Asher is retiring from Sparrow; she has been Secretary of M-MHSL and plans to continue with the group. Their next meeting takes place on November 3 at Ingham.

John also mentioned that Michigan State University will be providing Web access to MD Consult and STAT!-Ref for anyone with MSU pilot IDs. Ellen O'Donnell added that St. John is doing a one-year trial of MD Consult for a research project. MD Consult contains all the W.B. Saunders *Clinics* titles in full text from 1995 on.

<u>NMHSLG</u> – Norma Powers sent word that she has met with the new librarian at Northern Michigan Hospital, Anne Foster. Anne is coming from Indiana University and is new to hospital librarianship. She went through high school in Petoskey, and her parents recently retired there, so she has ties to the area.

<u>UPHSLC</u> – No report.

<u>WMHSLA</u> – Sandy Swanson said they have all been working on the conference. Betty Marshall reported an area code change for Muskegon County and areas directly north. The area code is now 231.

<u>GMR</u> – No report at this time.

Old Business

No old business was raised.

New Business

Leslie Behm announced that MSU Libraries have received a Technology Awareness grant. They are planning a conference for June 1-2, 2000 at the Kellogg Center in East Lansing. This will be a joint effort with the Michigan Osteopathic Association. The focus is on communication mechanisms for practitioners (e.g. e-mail, chat rooms). It will be similar to last year's "Bridging

the Millenium" conference held in Minneapolis. Leslie hopes MHSLA would be willing to contribute some money toward the conference. They anticipate about 100 attendees.

Diane Hummel raised the question of discounting MHSLA conference and membership fees. We have had inquiries from students, poster presenters, and emeritus members (MHSLA members recently retired from their positions) regarding a discounted conference rate. Several Board members observed that this issue has been raised before and is covered in the Education Committee handbook. We have never offered student rates for the conference, and poster presenters do not get a discount either. Leslie Behm thinks that panelists may be entitled to a reduced conference rate. She will check her copy of the Education Committee handbook for guidelines. Valeria Long mentioned that she has never seen the Education Committee handbook; it would have been very useful to her in planning the conference. No one seems to know where the handbook is. Diane Hummel will ask Maureen Watson to check the archives. The handbook needs to be located, then we will check the guidelines and determine if they need to be revised.

For this conference it is too late to offer discounts, but this question could be a topic of discussion for the business meeting. There are a number of arguments against offering discounts: "emeritus" could be hard to define, and conference and membership fees are already very low.

The Board discussed ways to promote student development and encourage their participation in the Association. Mike Simmons suggested that the annual conference may not be the best venue for students' professional development. Better results would come from one-on-one mentoring relationships. Several MHSLA members indicated on their membership form that they are willing to mentor; perhaps we could contact Lynda Baker at Wayne State to set these mentors up with students. Leslie Behm observed that MDMLG would have to bear the brunt of this responsibility. Students don't want to have to travel very far from Detroit to do their work. Lynda Baker does have good systems in place for putting students into internships and mentoring situations around Detroit. Perhaps the best MHSLA could do is offer a list of locations outside the metropolitan Detroit area that are willing to sponsor interns. The question was referred to the Publications Committee's Marketing Subcommittee (Leslie and Diane) for further recommendations.

Doreen Bradley announced the 1999-2000 committee chairs who have been selected so far:

Openings are still available to chair the Audit, Education, Document Delivery, Research, and Technology Committees.

Doreen Bradley then set the date for our next meeting. It will take place in Traverse City at the Park Place Hotel, Friday, November 5, 1999. The Conference Planning Committee will meet at 9:00 and the Board will meet at 10:00. Rooms are available at the Park Place for \$65 a night.

Diane Hummel and Leslie Behm reported on the Access Michigan Electronic Community Health Information Initiative (AMECHII). This group, convened by Harvey Brenneise, met at the Michigan Public Health Institute in July, August, and September to brainstorm. They want to provide full-text access to health information. They're working on a planning grant to be submitted to the Kellogg Foundation in November. The project will be very costly. It complements the "Life Sciences Corridor" project which is focusing on technological infrastructure for a narrow band across the state. AMECHII focuses on information resources and its mandate is state-wide. Diane will present an update on AMECHII at the MHSLA business meeting next week.
